In the National League, Chuck Paton of the Cubs hit a grand slam home run as the Cubs defeated the Cardinals 15-9.

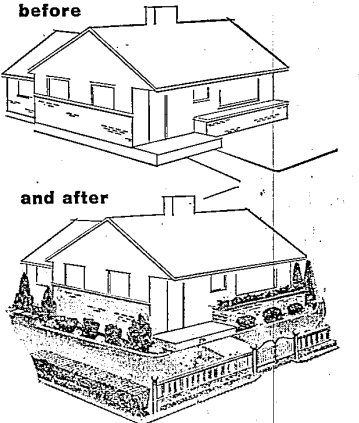
