Jr. Achievers Set Budget for To Blast Off '64 Saturday Night

Official action was taken by the Farmington Board of Education Monday night approving a budget of \$165,000 for the construction of a six classroom addition and the making of other improvements at the Gill School on Gill Road south of Nine Mile. This amount budgeted does not include money which will be needed to equip the addition or the architectural fees that will be involved. Prior to this action, a change in originally approved plans was made calling for the inclusion of approximately 80 square feet of additional storage space in the addition. In other action relative to this addition, the Board approved the appointment of Arthur Gallispe to make a topographical survey of that portion of the site where the addition will be made. A firm to make test borings of the soil conditions in the area was also named.

Planners Start Detailed Study On Apartments

Members of the Farmington City Planning Commission are working in three separate sub-committees in an effort to determine what course of action should be followed in the future with regard to additional requests for rezoning of land to permit still more apartment construction here. At a work session on Monday night of this week, a substantial amount of time was spent discussing initial phases of work which have been undertaken by members of each of the sub-committees. One of the sub-committees is studying the economic effects of apartment developments can have on a community. Another is getting into detailed consideration of the various types of apartment developments there are and the advantages and disadvantages that prevail in each. The third sub-committee is studying the sociological aspects of apartment developments in communities.

THE TEACHERS and counselors representing the study group recommended strongly that the Board make every effort possible to start a vocational training program as soon as possible, whereby students qualifying could be put into a program of working outside of school part-time and attending school part-time. The hiring of a coordinator to develop and supervise a cooperative and occupational program of this kind in the community was felt by the committee members to be the first step that would have to be taken. The Board agreed to give the committee the responsibility to prompt and careful consideration.

School Board Gets Report On Adult Ed., Summer Sch.

A detailed statistical report on the adult education and summer school programs presently being offered in the Farmington School District was presented to the Board of Education Monday night by Richard Tyler, director of these programs. Tyler also made some suggestions in his report on ways that he felt the programs might be expanded and improved upon even further in the future. Up until the time of Tyler's appointment as director of the adult education program on a part-time basis in conjunction with supervision of the summer school program, the district's regular administrative staff had handled the adult program. RECOGNIZING the need for a separate director to handle details of the ever growing adult education program, Tyler's appointment to this position was made by the Board of Education in January of 1960.

Between last year and this, the number taking adult education classes has more than doubled and several new classes are now being offered. Tyler's figures revealed that over 800 persons had enrolled in adult education classes for the current year compared to less than 377 during the 1962-63 school year. Tyler also stated that the summer school program which has been conducted for the past two summers has been well received locally. There are 613 students enrolled in summer classes in 1961, Tyler's report revealed. BOTH PROGRAMS have self sustaining with all major operating costs having been met by tuition payments from students. One suggestion made by Tyler was that the adult education program be expanded to offer high school credit courses for those who had not completed their schooling during their youth. Adult education courses in a more vocational area and those providing leadership training were also suggested by him as possible additions which might be made. Safety and driver education courses for adults, parent and family classes and classes in civic and public affairs were other areas in which he felt the adult education program might be broadened.

Police measured the distance from the point of impact in front of St. Fabian's to the spot where both cars ended up, further west on 12 Mile.
