of the other fellow. Of course not,

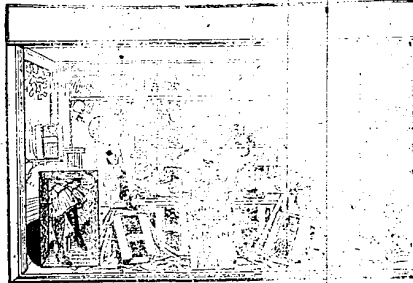
