New Softball League Action Slated to Open

The captains of the Farmington Softball League will meet Tuesday night, June 16, at 8 p.m. in the Farmington Junior High School cafeteria to draw up game schedules for the first season under the lights in the Farmington City Park.

At a meeting held Monday night, the newly formed Farmington Softball League officers and appointed captains for the season. Presiding as President of the League will be Ronald G. Holland, head coach at North Farmington High School.

Other officers elected Monday night were:

WARREN MacKENZIE, Vice President; Tom Wilson, Treasurer; and Ken Dean, Treasurer.

Captains for the coming season: Dennis O'Neill (GR. 6-3299); Conrad Dornier (GR. 4-2833); Ray Martin (476-4221); Ira Carley (GR. 4-8599); Ken Galt (476-4082); Phil Parsons (GR. 4-1895); and Wally Prince (517-8294). An eighth team is still in the formative stages and persons not yet assigned to a League team may still have an opportunity for an opening. Call League President Ron Holland at GR. 6-3383 for further information.

The only requirements for joining the League are:

- 1) Participants must be at least 21 years of age.
- 2) Must be residents of Farmington City or Township or employed in Farmington.
- 3) And finally, defray their share of the expenses for team equipment and League expenses.

THE EIGHT-TEAM League will play on either Thursday or Friday nights, according to arrangements which must be approved by the Farmington City Council which assigns the use of the City Park's lighted baseball diamond.

A total of 120 men will make up the rosters of the eight-team League, allowing 15 men to each team. The teams will play with ten men on a side with an eight-man minimum.

Form New Colt & Pony Leagues

This year the South Farmington Babe Ruth was dropped in favor of a pony league and colt league.

The Pony League (age 13-14) is composed of six teams. Two teams composed of 15 and 19 year olds merged with 4 teams from North Farmington to form the newly organized, North-South Farmington Colt League.

These six teams will each have a 15-game schedule; playing each team 3 times.

The two S. Farmington teams are the Orioles, coached by Ed Donoghue; and the White Sox, coached by Cliff Terry. The four N. Farmington teams are the Yankees, the Indians, the Senators, and the Tigers.

ALL SIX TEAMS saw action last Saturday for the first time this year.

The two new S. Farmington colt teams were pitted in action against each other last Saturday. The Orioles dominated the White Sox by a score of 5 to 1, behind the 2-hit pitching of Tom Donoghue.

In the first inning, the White Sox' Jerry Turner collected the first hit off Donoghue as he

blooped a "Texas league sin" into right field. The other hit for the White Sox produced their only run as in the second inning Don Wright lined a single to left, and the ball got by the left fielder to allow Wright to scamper around the bases. After this 13 men in a row went down, then two walks were given up by Tom Donoghue in the sixth.

The Orioles took advantage of White Sox mishaps in the third as Ron Lee and Tom Donoghue singled and scored on errors. In the fourth a walk to Jean Butters and a double by Mike Perry produced the third run.

In the top of the fifth the Orioles put the icing on the cake, as Tom Donoghue and Bill Pell walked and scored on Jean Butters' single to right. Don Morgan pitched 7 innings for the White Sox allowing only six hits, walking 3 and striking out 3. He took the loss. Jerry Turner pitched the last inning for the White Sox and retired the Orioles, 1-2-3.

TOM DONOGHUE went the distance for the Orioles allowing only 2 hits, striking out 7 and walking 3; and in turn took the victory.

There was excellent fielding by the Orioles' Mike Perry, Glen Lindsay, and Wayne Johnson.

NOTE: (Because the newly ordered baseball suits for these two new colt teams didn't arrive from Chicago, the two teams were without uniforms for the day. Coming to the rescue was the American Legion team as they loaned their uniforms to the White Sox, and the Orioles used the Legion All-Star uniforms.)

The N.F. Yankees shutout the NE Indians by a score of 5 to 0. Doug Mills pitched a brilliant 1 hitter; he also added to his cause by smacking out a homerun. Throwing star for the Yankees was Mike Ortwein as he had a perfect day at the plate, going 3 for 3. The only hit off Mills was by Rick Ed Kenney. Doug Mills was the winning pitcher and Indian North the loser, even though he gave up only 6 hits.

To the other Colt game held up at N.F., the Tigers edged out a 8 to 7 victory. Dan Lightman was the winning pitcher and Frit Simon the loser.
