The playoffs then moved to Beverly Hills. The first game was played against Southgate. Farmington won 3-1 behind the fine pitching of Mike McCoy with relief from Dick Butlers in the 7th inning. Mike had no-hitter going into the 8th.

The next day N. Farmington lost to Birmingham 8-3 when the Birmingham pitcher pitched a one-hit game. He did walk 1K over the course of the game. Being tough in the clutch. Having lost this game it was necessary to play Southgate again that same afternoon. N. Farmington beat Southgate in a close game 8-7.

THE CLIMAX CAME Saturday in the game to decide the District Championship. One point Birmingham was the opponent. As the box score below shows, it was a nip and tuck battle. N. Farmington held lead 5-4 at the top of the 6th. The game was marked by several nearly serious accidents. Mike McCoy was hit on the helmet by a pitched ball, but he was able to stay in the game. Doug Drapalski robbed a Birmingham batter of a home run when he leaped high against the fence to catch a fly ball. He crashed into the fence but managed to hold onto the ball as he fell to the ground. In the next inning, Gary Zerkhan ran into the fence, along the foul line, at full speed while chasing a foul fly. He hit the fence so hard he bent the top rail, and the wind whistled out of him but after first aid he continued to play.

The Birmingham pitcher was quite wild but, in the first game, tough in the clutch. The final score was 7-4.

American Legion All-Stars Sparkle 18th District Victory

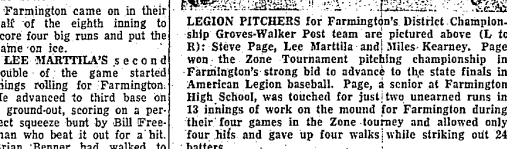
Farmington's American Legion baseball team clinched their most successful season yet in history last Saturday as the Groves-Walker Post 346 players selected to the 18th District All-Star squad contributed mightily in the 8-4 victory scored over the 7th District All-Stars, under the lights at Berkeley.

TOM CUNILLO of Farmington got credit for the victory after coming on in relief in the 8th inning with the score knotted, 4-4. Cunillo, an honor graduate of Our Lady of Sorrows High School, cooled off the 7th District stars and was touched for just one hit and struck out one batter.

Farmington came on in their last of the eighth inning to score four big runs and put the same on ice.

JIM STEVENSON's three-run homer which gave Farmington a 3-2 victory over the St. Clair Legion Post in the opening game of the Zone Tourney provided local fans with great hopes.

And Jim Actell's two home runs in Zone play, boosting his season total to four and tying him with Kraft for the team leadership, sparked the Farmington Legion team's bid for the Zone Championship.

Farmington scored victories over St. Clair and Owosso before bowing to the eventual tourney winners in two successive games. Flint led the way in Menominee, as Battle Creek and Detroit's Edison Post were matched in the state finals after the elimination games. Edison Post beat Battle Creek 2-0, on Sunday, August 9, to earn the state crown, their 21st state title in six years.

Edison Post won the American Legion baseball National Championship in 1959. They now will advance to the National Zone tournament at Asheville, Kentucky with the National Finals scheduled to take place in Little Rock, Arkansas.

Farmington's overall record for the season was 21 victories and one tie against nine losses. Almost all of the players on this year's 18th District Championship team will be eligible to play again next year.

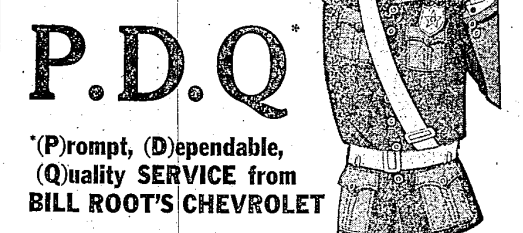
