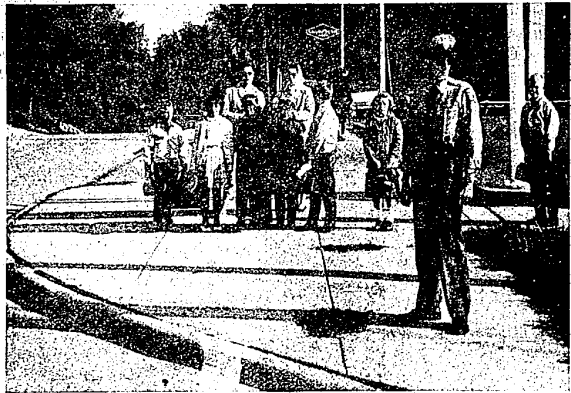

Several residents living south of Grand River near Power Road in the City of Farmington appeared at the City Council meeting Monday night, September 21, to seek a solution to the problem being posed at the intersection by heavy traffic which has made it difficult for pedestrians to cross the street.

Re-zoning for Village Green Apartments, on the agenda of the Township Zoning Board meeting tonight, Sept. 24, as a continuation of a public hearing, was the subject of a citizens' meeting held last week on Wednesday, Sept. 16.

Industrial Drive Open to Traffic

City Manager John Dinan reported this week that the new industrial drive running along the north side of the industrial park development on Eight Mile Road east of Farmington Road has now been opened to traffic but some work still remains to be done.

John Pheny, president of the Old Homestead Subdivision Association, presided at the meeting. Thomas Duke, president of the development company for Village Green, was on hand by invitation to speak for the project; while Harris Berger, a resident of Old Homestead,

spoke against the development. Both gentlemen were given 30 minutes speaking time and 15 minutes time for rebuttal. After the presentations Duke left and a vote was taken.

This drive runs from Farmington Road on the west to Chesley Drive on the east and has been constructed primarily to handle truck traffic to and from the various plants in the industrial park. It will also permit some additional industrial plants to be built in the small park on the south side of the new roadway.

Nov. 3 Election Registration Deadline Near

Newcomers to the area or any others not presently registered to vote in Farmington City or Township are being reminded this week that they have only ten days left (excluding Saturdays) in which to register to qualify as a voter in the November 3 Presidential Election.

The final date for registering to vote in the November 3 election is Monday, Oct. 5, Township Clerk Floyd Cairns and City Clerk Mrs. Trema Quinn remind.

REGISTRATION as a voter may be done anytime during regular business hours Monday through Friday at both the township clerk's office and the city clerk's office.

City Council Tables Request By Elks For Liquor Permit

The Farmington Elks, B.P.O.E. 1966, will have to submit plans to the Farmington City Council on their proposed remodeling of the old Municipal Building west of their lodge on Grand River Avenue, before the Council will approve a liquor or dance permit.

IT WAS POINTED OUT that the Public Safety Department has not completed its personal investigation of the proposed manager of the Elks Lodge and the proposed arrangement of the bar facilities. Approval of these items is necessary before the Club License can be granted by the State Liquor Control Commission.

THE CONCERN expressed by Councilman Forrest was whether the ground floor operations in the old City Hall Building license, Councilman Henry Forrest said no action should be taken on the matter until a floor plan is submitted by the Elks.

Ex-Constable Pleads Guilty to Embezzlement

Former Constable for the City of Farmington Arthur L. Forgette pleaded guilty to charges of embezzlement in the Oakland County Circuit Court of Judge James S. Thornburn Monday, September 21.

Forgette who had been sought by authorities since an \$1,100 shortage was discovered in his accounts last July, surrendered himself to the Oakland County Police Department last Thursday afternoon, September 17. He was arraigned on the embezzlement charges before Judge Sylvester Pheny in Municipal Court at 4 p.m. on Thursday and waived examination.

Governor George Romney will make three appearances in Farmington on Saturday, October 3, according to the Republican State Executive Committee for Oakland County.

Faces Murder Charge In Dentist's Slaying

The examination on first degree murder charges against Farmington City Police Officer Wells S. Herrington in the gunshot slaying of his wife's sister, Dr. John R. Foster, 41, a Birmingham dentist, is scheduled to open at 10 a.m. tomorrow morning in the Farmington Municipal Court of Judge Sylvester J. Pheny.

Herrington stood mute at his arraignment on the charge last Thursday following the Wednesday night shooting in his Farmington West apartment. He and his wife, Betty, 42, were talking over a reconciliation after a separation of several months during which time she had been seeing Foster.

City Take-Over of School Rd. Snagged on Repairs Issue

The Farmington City Council called for a full evaluation of the proposed take-over by the City of a service drive owned jointly by the Farmington School District and Our Lady of Sorrows.

IF THE ROADWAY were dedicated to the City and brought up to standard, Dinan said gas and weight tax monies could offset any maintenance cost in making the roadway serviceable to the general public.
