

# Diamondmen Win Opener from RU, 2-1

# Search Drill Staged in Twp.

The clock struck four, and with the full moon somewhere over the horizon, the cry of a wolfman struck terror into the hearts of Redford Union's baseball players.

Dan Wolfman, only a sophomore, was a monster on the mound as he tossed a neat three-hitter in leading the Falcons to a 2-1 decision over Redford Union. Dapper Dan went the full distance, fanning 14 along the way. Thursday's opening day triumph equaled the total "wow" record for Farmington last season as one game.

FHS batmen displayed the poorer hitting which was noticeably lacking last season. Of the five hits, four went for extra bases, including triples by Mike Searey and Perry.

"Dan the Wolfman" was not a wildman by any means. He walked only one batter during the seventh inning. In fact, after the first inning in which he yielded two hits, Wolfman was almost untouchable, ending the game with two strike outs.

Falcon fans hope that Wolfman and his teammates will not change back to last season's form when the moon is gone. This Thursday, Farmington's baseballers will try to win the North Farmington Raiders.



THE CALL WENT OUT for Farmington Township's Mounted Division Police Auxiliary at 1:25 p.m. on Sunday, April 17, and shortly after 2 p.m. seven officers had answered the call and were ready to begin their action. Sgt. John Polder briefed the Mounted Division lawmen on the facts for a simulated search for a lost child while horses were saddled. The Auxiliary officers had trailed their horses to the scene of the hunt. Halted Road just south of I-96.

Wayne Johnson singled with one out to move Lee to third. Then Mike (the Blonde Bomber) Perry flied out to left, sending Lee home to tie up the winning run.

In the fifth, Wolfman hit a two-bagger with two out. Dana Kiltredge struck out, but the Farmer catcher dropped the ball and the speedy Kiltredge raced safely to first. The Redford Union pitcher was shaken after this and balked in the winning run.

## Falcon Track Team Defeats Redford Union

Farmington's track and field team swept past an injury-ridden track squad from Redford Union last Thursday, 72-36.
