

Jr. Football Opens Show Coaching Need

The Junior Football Season opened on a sour note when the Varsity lost their first game of the season after their last year's unbeaten record. At the Lions' Ford Field on a rainy day, after the kickoff to the Lions on the first play from scrimmage, the Lions scored but couldn't make the extra point.

Before half-time they added another two more touchdowns and one extra point. In the third quarter they added an other touchdown and extra point that completed the scoring of the day—Lions 26, Rockets 0.

The Rockets had two costly fumbles during drives near the Lions' goal line and their best offensive efforts were in the last quarter. They had been offensively dominating the quarter and were on their way to score when they fumbled the ball on the two yard line shortly before the game ended.

The whole team played well but special praise for Jim Holton who recovered a fumble, Tim Connolly for his tackling, Bob Holton for his touchdowns and both Mike Cruelli and Dan Jones for their long runs and touchdowns.

Township Ordinance

made to each premises connected to the system in the amount of \$2.25 per 1,000 cubic feet of water consumed, with a minimum quarterly charge of \$2.25.

(b) Meter Service Charge. A monthly meter service charge shall be made to each premises connected to the system in accordance with the following schedule but shall be payable quarterly:

(c) Capital Charge. A charge of \$75.00 per unit up to a maximum of 500 units (\$37,500) shall be made to each premises connected to the system. This charge shall be paid in cash at the time application is made for a connection permit.

(d) Debt Service Charge. An annual debt service charge of \$200.00 per unit for the first 20 units and \$4.00 per unit for additional units up to a maximum of 500 units shall be made to each premises connected to the system, which shall be payable quarterly until all obligations of the Township to the County of Oakland under the contract establishing the System have been fully satisfied.

(e) Direct Connection Charge. A charge of \$400.00 shall be made to each premises connected directly to transmission mains shown on Exhibit "A". Such charge shall be paid in full when the connection permit is issued, except that, in the case of premises on which the dwelling or other structure to be connected is in existence at the date of adoption of this ordinance, such charge may be paid in 60 quarterly installments of \$5.00.

(f) The following charges shall be made for each water service installation:

The total charge shall be determined by multiplying the

variable charge per foot by the full width of the street or alley. Any paving break \$50.00 additional.

Section 5. The Township shall pay for all water used by it at the water consumption rate set forth above, except that for fire hydrant service, the charge shall be \$5.00 per year for each hydrant in the district.

Section 6. The Township Board may establish higher water consumption rates than those set forth for other charges to premises outside the system which are connected to the system.

Section 7. No free service shall be furnished by the system to the Township or to any person, firm or corporation, public or private, or to any public agency or instrumentality. Charges for services furnished by the system shall be billed and collected quarterly or oftener, as shall be determined by the Township Board.

Such charges shall become due at such times, not exceeding 20 days after the reading of the water meter, as shall be established by resolution of the Township Board, and if such charges are not paid on or before such date, then a penalty of 10 per cent shall be added thereto. In the event that the charges for any such services furnished to any premises shall not be paid within 30 days after the due date thereof, then all services furnished by the system to such premises may be discontinued. Services so discontinued shall not be restored until all sums then due and owing, including penalties, shall be paid, plus a shut-off charge of \$1.00 and a turn-on charge of \$1.00.

Section 8. Charges for services furnished by the system to any premises shall be a lien thereon, and on September 1 of each year the person or agency charged with the management of said system, shall certify any such charges which have been delinquent six (6) months or more, to the Township Supervisor who shall enter the same upon the next tax roll against the premises to which such services

are rendered, and said lien shall be enforced in the same manner as provided in respect to taxes assessed upon such roll; Provided that when a tenant is responsible for the payment of any such charge against any premises, and the Township Board is so notified in writing, with a true copy of the lease of the affected premises (if there be one) attached, then no such charge shall become a lien against such premises from and after the date of such notice.

Section 9. The revenues of the system are hereby pledged in accordance with the contract establishing the system. All such revenues as collected shall be set aside and paid in full by charge to such premises shall have been made as security for the payment of charges thereon.
