ELEVEN SENTENCED BY JUDGE SMITH

Range all the Way From Suspended Sentence to Five Years in States Prison

Eleven prisoners were sentenced by Judge Smith in the circuit court Monday. Dwight Sutherland and Bert Green who admitted that they broke into a restaurant in Rochester, were released on two years probation. The judge lectured them severely and told them if they were found intoxicated again it would mean a violation of the terms of their probation and they would be brought in and sentenced.

Glen McIntire, charged with burglary was also given two years' probation.

For furnishing liquor to an habitual drunkard, John Jackson received 65 days in the Detroit House of Correction. In the same institution and for the same length of time Ned Taylor will be confined for the larceny of a horse and buggy.

Colonel Mars' got \$50 fine or 30 days in the house of correction or furnishing liquors to minors.

Ellsworth Montross 90 days in the House of Correction for selling liquor without a license.

Harry Geneva, charged with carrying concealed weapons, will spend six months to five years in Jackson.

Six months to five years in Jackson was the sentence imposed on Samuel Miller for the larceny of a horse.

L. George Finckepaugh, who was found guilty of gross indecency was sentenced for two to five years in Jackson.

Mary Ann Mason

Mary Ann Mason died Monday morning at the Pontiac state hospital, of which institution she had been an inmate for about 30 years. She was 86 years of age and was the mother of Mrs. William Shear of this place, to whose home the remains were taken Tuesday.

The funeral was held Wednesday afternoon at the M. E. church, Rev. George E. Cullen officiating, and interment was made in Oak wood cemetery.

The County Road Commission

Members of the county road commission are completing the surveys for the highways which it proposed to improve next year under the county road law with the aid of the state of Michigan. The surveyors are at work at present on the turnpike running northwest from Pontiac.

The commission will go before the board of supervisors at its meeting next month and submit the list of roads which it suggests the county take over. The supervisors at that time will select the roads it wishes and determine the amount of money to be raised for the work.

It is planned to improve the turnpike its entire length. Main roads leading to all the villages and principal east and west and north and south thoroughfares everywhere throughout the county are included in the plan.

Conference Appointments

From the list of conference appointments we learn that Rev. F. C. Waters is going to Redford. Rev. C. S. Lee returns to Farmington and Rev. R. M. Pierce also goes back to Northville. Rev. Geo. E. Cullen is returned to the West Grand Boulevard church which he has served for the past year. Rev. C. M. Loomis goes to Henderson; a little town in Shiawassee county.

Another Aged Resident Gone

Isaiah Johnson died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. George Hake in Livonia early Tuesday morning. He had spent most of the summer with his other daughter, Mrs. Harry Lewis, but at his request was taken to Livonia Saturday afternoon.

Mr. Johnson had been suffering from heart trouble all summer and his death was not altogether unexpected by the bereaved family.

Isaiah Johnson was born Feb. 21, 1836, at Lyndell, Chester county, Pennsylvania. He was married to Phoebe S. Roberts in Livonia March 3, 1864, and they spent all their married life on a farm east of Farmington until they moved to this village in 1903. Mrs. Johnson died a few years ago and since that time Mr. Johnson had made his home with his three children who survive him—Mrs. Harry Lewis and John Johnson of Farmington and Mrs. Geo. Hake of Livonia.

The funeral services were held in the M. E. church in Farmington at 2:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon and interment was made in Quaker cemetery.
