Jay Cassell State Wrestling Titlist

For the first time in the 11 years that Farmington High School has offered competitive wrestling, the school has a state champion.

He is Jay Cassell, a 120-pound junior, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Cassell of 3402 Grand River.

Cassell a week ago won his final match in the state wrestling finals in Ann Arbor with a 7-0 decision over a man previously unbeaten.

His coaches consider him the top high school wrestler in the state. In a match last year, he defeated the wrestler who won the next heavier (127-pound) title.

In individual matches, Cassell has won 28 and lost only one this year. He has wrestled not only in the 120 but in the 127, 133 and 138 pound classes.

Wrestling runs in the family. An older brother, Bill, was on the FHS team several years ago and qualified for the state tournament.

Little League Rally To Be Held Mar. 15

Farmington High, whose basketball team seems to specialize in building up big leads and then bobbling, practiced its craft twice last week — with success the second time disastrously.

The Falcons squeaked by North Farmington March 3 to capture a district title but were edged last Wednesday by Livonia Bentley, which Friday was scheduled to meet Catholic Central for the Class A regional crown.

FARMINGTON FELL TO Bentley's Bulldogs 58-56 in a sometimes lopsided, sometimes tenser thriller in Livonia Franklin's gym.

With three minutes gone in the third quarter, FHS built up a dozen point lead, 41-29, only to see it melt by the end of the period as Bentley's quiet suddenly began potting shots which earlier in the game they had missed.

Bentley's Mike McCauley and Dan Doyle accounted for most of the Bulldogs' 17-point orgy in that stanza, sinking field goals on hook shots, long jumps, and layups.

If only shots from the court counted, Farmington might have won 24 baskets to 22.

But the margin of the FHS defeat actually came at the foul line. Farmington committed 15 mistakes, and Bentley got 12 of 20 free throws (an unimpressive 60 per cent). Bentley, meanwhile, committed nine fouls; the Farmington record was eight of 11 free throws (72 per cent), but that simply wasn't enough to overcome the deficit.

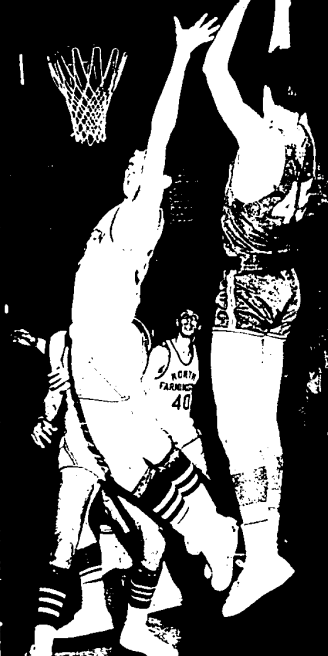

ORDINANCE NO. 30-E
An Ordinance to amend Ordinance No. 30-A entitled, "An Ordinance to provide for the establishment, operation and maintenance of water supply system 'A' to serve water supply system 'A' in the Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan; to provide for the acquisition of certain water transmission mains and related facilities as a part of said system; to provide for the issuance and sale of revenue bonds to defray a part of the cost of such acquisition; to provide for the retirement and security of said bonds; to provide for other matters relative to said system and said bonds; and to repeal Ordinance No. 30 of the Township Ordinances."

The Township of Farmington, Oakland County, Michigan, Ordinance No. 30-A, hereby amended to read as follows:

additional \$14.00 shall be added to the installation charge.

The term "unit" as used above is hereby defined as the average amount of water consumed by the occupancy of a single family residence, such average amount to be determined by the Township Board.

The Township Board shall establish appropriate standards for determining the number of units to be assigned to premises of different character or occupancy.

The Township shall pay for all water used by it at the water consumption rates set forth above, except that for fire hydrant service, the charge shall be \$5.00 per year, for each hydrant in the district. Charges against the Township shall be payable in quarterly installments of the amount sufficient for that purpose.

The cost of water service connections from the Township water mains to private premises shall not be paid from the proceeds of the bond issue or from the revenues of the system.

The Township Board may establish higher water consumption rates than those above set forth for charges to premises for other matters relative to said system.

Recreation Draws 2,617

A total of 2750 youngsters attended the Farmington Area Recreation Commission's six week winter program. This figure represents a 5 per cent increase when compared to last year's number of 2617. The North playground sites outside the South to total count 1604 to 1146.

The average daily attendance at each of the eight sites was raised from 55 to 59. All schools showed an increase with the exception of one. Beechview school led all schools with a total of 613 for an average of 102. Kenbrook was second with its average of 84.

Efforts will be made because of the good acceptance to either lengthen the program next year or increase the number of sites if the budget permits according to Director Evans Bageris.

Plans for the Commission's six week summer recreation program are now taking

shape. Tentative plans call for the program to begin on the afternoon after school ends and run until the first week of August.
