

South End Water Pressure Increased

The capacity for meeting hot-weather water demands in Farmington south of the I-696 expressway were increased "substantially" by the opening of a filtered-water reservoir, according to the Detroit Water Department.

When the Kendallwoods were developed the Thompson Brown Company drilled the well and built the water tower to supply that development. The county water department eventually took over the facility.

Since then Briar Hill, Colony Park, and Canterbury Commons have all been tapped into the Kendallwood system.

As a result, no one is happy with the water pressure in that area. The cost of the Southfield reservoir was \$1,725,980. It has been open about a month.
