Management Still Key To Hog Profit

Although APP and newly discovered antibiotics can be beneficial in getting fast gains in swine, they are no substitute for good feed, management and sanitation. Michigan State College researchers have found that the best results with these "miracle drugs" come when used in the best feeds available. When used with a low protein and vitamin feed, results are not very spectacular. Good management, good feed and sanitation are still essential to best results. Dr. R. W. Luecke, agricultural chemist, says high levels of antibiotics get good gains in swine in feeding experiments, but reducing the level makes results less noticeable. "We need to know much more about the use of antibiotics in swine feed before we can advise the farmer as to just which antibiotic or mixture of antibiotics will give the best results," Luecke reports.

Start Live-Trapping Ducks in Trenton Channel

Conservation department game warden have started live-trapping, checking and banding the first of some 5,000 or more ducks along the open Trenton channel. To get more complete information on wintering migratory birds, the survey crew will not attempt to trap 10,000 as last year. The crew will fluorescently band body shot and lead in the glazard.
