FARMINGTON TO HAVE FAST TEAM

Making and Laying Plans for Winning Both Games Next Saturday.

The annual baseball struggle between Redford and Farmington will be pulled off at Redford next Saturday morning at 10 o'clock in the forenoon and again in the afternoon at three.

That both teams are going to make a determined effort to win is known by the fact that several Detroit players are known to have accepted commissions to play with Redford, and two or three star players from about the state have been secured by Farmington.

Next Saturday is the annual "Come-All Ye" celebration, which each year draws a big crowd, and the gathering last year numbered nearly 3,000. Indications are that Farmington will go down enmasse, and that the village will have a rather deserted look, at least in the afternoon.

School Opens September 8

According to members of the high school board, many applications for entry are being received, and the prospects are that the attendance this year will be the largest in the history of the school.

Monday, Sept. 7th being Labor Day, school will open on the following morning.

During the vacation months the building has been renovated and overhauled, and put in readiness for the new year's work.

Latest Election Returns

Latest returns at the time of going to press indicate that Osborn will be the Republican candidate for Governor.

In the county, Arthur M. Young has defeated Sevener for Treasurer and Dan A. McGaffey has won over Thompson for Register of Deeds. The only other county office for which there was any contest, was that of coroners, Farmer and Brace having won out over Adams.

There is every indication that Frank L. Covert has defeated Arthur J. Waters for the nomination for state senator in the 12th District. These are the only offices for which there were any contests. The vote was very light throughout the county.
