ECHOES OF LECTURES

Delivered by G. Stanley Hall at Ypsilanti Last Week
(Communicated)

Half the work now done in the American kindergarten is trash. America is quick to imitate and quick to overdo. We have out Froebled Froebled. America has more kindergarten training schools, more kindergarten teachers and more children in the kindergarten than all the rest of the civilized nations combined.

Every mother and every young woman contemplating matrimony should attend the kindergarten and post herself in such a manner that she will know how to take care of children. A woman forfeits the title of motherhood when she shifts the care of the four-year old infant upon the cold-blooded machine educated old maid.

Children would be farther advanced at the end of the twelfth year if they did not go to school till they are seven years of age.

Forty per cent of the college graduates do not marry till they are past forty years of age, leaving the coming generations to be bred by the uncultured. Seventy-five per cent of the women in our schools and offices should be in the home and mothers of families.

No child should go to school to a woman teacher after he is nine years of age.

Japan and China will eventually dominate the world because ninety-five per cent of their population marry at the marriageable age.

To a woman marriage is destiny. To a man it is only an incident.

Mothers are in too great a hurry to get the children end. The child should not be in an upright position till he gets there by his own efforts. Creeping is necessary to develop the chest and spine.

Songs should be taught in every grade in the school before the children know the notes. If the children wish to swing their hands or feet or jump while singing, let them swing. It is psychologically natural. School songs should be of home, nature, religion and country.

Corporal punishment should not be removed from school. A little wholesome spanking is necessary for the psychological development of the average child.

Sixty per cent of the girls from twelve to fourteen years resolve to be either milliners or dressmakers. Let them sew and fuss. It will all work out. This age with girls is also the age of wonderful secrets. Each girl usually has about four companions that she tell most everything to, and but one that she tells everything to. Girls develop mental keenness about three years in advance of the boy.

In matters of school discipline America is the laughing stock of the educated world.

The schools of America are trying to do too much and are not doing the work well enough.

In Germany a text book costs five cents. The teacher furnishes the rest of the material. When a student has finished a German school he can write the text books that he needs.

Every teacher should be a good story teller, especially in the lower grades. She should be able to tell the story well, but never should explain the moral. She should also induce the children to tell stories. Too much stress is laid upon carbon dioxide in the school room and not enough attention is paid to changes of heat.

The bible should not be cut out of the morning exercises in school. The bible is a love story from start to finish and parts of it should

be studied in school for their literary merit.

Bible teaching in the Sunday-school should be revolutionized. Classes in Sunday school should not be taught by the untrained, by the faddist, by the credulist or the crank. Such teaching drives the boys and young men away from the Sunday-school and keeps them away.

Before the stage of adolescence has passed boys should be taught the history of the heroes of the old testament. After this period is passed the new testament should be introduced. While the boys are being taught let none of the Watch Dogs of Zion be within hearing. The bible is psychologically in accord with man and is the key to his development. Religion and the spirit of Christ is everywhere seriously handicapped by creeds and dogmas.

Welch Aeroplane Moved to Orchard Lake

The Welch aeroplane, which has been under process of construction in the Welch garage on Franklin boulevard, has been moved from the Welch property to Orchard Lake, where it will be housed in the riding hall at the Michigan Military Academy. On account of its bulkiness it was found impossible to set up the machine in the city and the riding hall at the academy offered a better opportunity. The frame work is so light that it could not stand a wind storm and could be left out of doors in inclement weather. The engine is yet to be installed before the aeroplane will be ready for a trial flight. One of the Welch six cylinder engines is to be given a try out, but this engine may be too heavy and another may have to be made especially for the ship.

Nearly all of the work on the Welch aeroplane is being done personally by Norbert Obrigt, who is the designer of the machine. He has perfect confidence in the plane and expects to navigate the air in it with perfect safety. It is not expected that the ship will be ready for trial flights for a month or six weeks—Pontiac Press Gazette.

Inmates Remain the Same.

The total number of inmates at the Eastern Michigan asylum at Pontiac remained the same for June as for the previous month, although there were quite a number of changes during the month.

At the close of June there was a total of 1,322 inmates in this institution—633 females and 689 males. During the month 19 new males and 10 females were admitted and total of 18 probationers returned.

However, to offset these large figures, 36 persons were discharged during the month—24 males and 12 females, and 11 deaths were also recorded. During the month there was a total of 1,369 inmates in this institution.
