



OCC To Offer New Business Classes

The business division of Oakland Community College will offer five new programs this fall, designed to meet needs within the area business community. The programs were developed after discussion with doctors, optometrists and industrialists. They include:

Legal secretary—a two-year program leading to a degree of associate in applied science which prepares the student in the highly specialized field of legal secretarial work.

Medical secretary—a one-year program leading to certification as a medical secretary. Provides the student with the skills needed to be a medical secretary, incorporating cooperative work experience in a physician's office. The student has the option of completing a second year in the medical secretarial program which leads to a degree of associate in applied science with a higher degree of competence in the field.

Clerical assistant—a one-year program leading to certification as a clerical assistant which prepares the student with the basic requirements of typing and stenographic procedures.

Optometric secretary—a one-year program leading to certification as a secretary with specific skills required in that technical field.

Industrial security—a two-year program leading to a degree of associate in applied science. This program is offered through the Law Enforcement Department at the Auburn Hills Campus only and deals with aspects of industrial security including fire protection and safety, plant protection, pilferage, surveillance, detection, interrogation, polygraph and investigation.

Group Backs Road Tax

Dejos Hamlin, of Farmington, chairman of the Oakland County Board of Supervisors, is one of the Oakland County group of civic, public and businessmen, who organized "Citizens for Adequate Roads" (CAR) at a county road tax proposal which will appear on the Aug. 6 primary ballot.

The proposal will seek approval of a one-mill property tax for five years to raise an estimated revenue of \$3.5 million a year.

An 85-page study produced by the County Road Commission has shown that the money is required to partially meet Oakland's "minimum major-primary road needs."

Stressing that only the most important "mile-type" roads were considered in the study, the road commission listed the county's minimum needs for 1968-78 as approximately 500 miles of county roads and 200 miles of city-village arteries. The tax proposal has met opposition from the Farmington Township Road Association because money from the proposed millage would be used only for these "mile-type" roads and would ignore local roads needs. The group voted to withhold support of the tax proposal until a substantial part of the revenue is pledged for repair of local road systems.

Primary roads in Farmington include Middlebelt, Orchard Lake, Farmington, 12 and 13 Mile Rds. These would be the only area roadways scheduled to benefit from the proposed tax increase.

The road commission study placed the cost of the 700-mile major-primary road project at nearly \$175 million, or \$17.5 million a year.

'Schools Cheated': Vagnozzi

Aldo Vagnozzi, candidate for State Representative in the 6th district, told the Southfield Democratic Club that the present Republican-controlled Legislature has shortchanged the area's school districts in the area of appropriations during a recent speech.

Vagnozzi said that the present State Representative from the 6th, as a member of that Republican majority, owes the people an explanation as to why so little was appropriated when so much was taken away through the state income tax which the lawmakers passed last year. "We were told that the schools would be the main beneficiaries from the state income tax," Vagnozzi reminded the audience. "Yet, state school aid to local districts went up an average of only about two and a half per cent in 1967."

"This year, the Farmington school district actually suffered a cut of about \$13 in the amount of aid which the state gives for each enrolled student. This lack of adequate support has forced many local school districts to seek millage tax increases just to maintain the present level of education."

"Residents of many districts, Farmington is an example, were subjected to three tax increases—the state income tax, higher property taxes through higher assessments, and millage increases—just to stand still," Vagnozzi declared.

Vagnozzi pledged that if elected to the State Legislature he would give top priority to adequate financing of education needs. "I would not stand idly by and watch our school districts be shortchanged in Lansing as they have been in the last two years." The 64th district includes the city and township of Farmington, parts of Southfield, Keego Harbor, West Bloomfield Township, Orchard Lake and the city of Lathrup Village.

Miss Benner Attends Institute

Virginia D. Benner of 27150 Orchard Lake Rd., Farmington, is currently attending a six-week summer institute for the advance study of English at Simmons College in Boston.

The Institute is designed for secondary school teachers of English who have a bachelor's degree, but had no more than a minor in English. It is supported by a \$45,000 grant from the U.S. Office of Education.

Miss Benner is a teacher at Clawson High School, Clawson.

Collins Denied Support

Clarification as to which Oakland County Republican organization aided the recent successful election campaign of Dr. Douglas Collins of Farmington Township for membership on the Oakland Community College Board of Trustees was offered this week.

A misinterpretation of a post-election comment by Dr. Collins led to an assertion in The Enterprise & Observer that the veterinarian had benefited from the backing of the county's official Republican Committee.

In reply to that assertion County Republican Chairman Joseph R. Farum issued this statement: "The Farmington Enterprise & Observer of June 16 carried a statement indicating that the Republican Committee of Oakland County had assumed the responsibility for distributing the literature of Dr. Douglas Collins in the Oakland Community College trustee race. This statement is totally untrue."

"Neither the Republican Committee of Oakland County nor any official or unofficial agent thereof distributed any literature or carried on any campaign for any candidate for the Oakland County College Board."

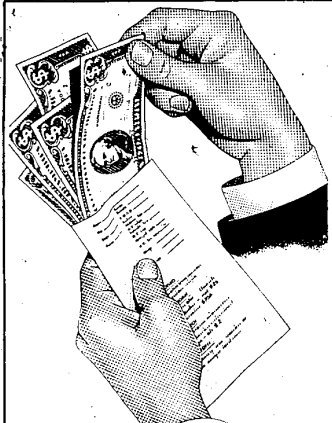
