Four In Race For Judge

MICHAEL J. HAND, 49, 34347 Cass Court, Farmington City, Graduate, University of Detroit (A.B. and L.L.B.). Currently Municipal Judge for City of Farmington. Currently senior partner of Detroit law firm of Hand, Kiefer, Allen & Ryan.

1. My 20 years' experience as an actively practicing trial attorney and my four years experience as a judge makes me feel that I am qualified to be elected District Judge.

2. I believe that the courts should be the impartial arbitrator of the rights of individuals and their duties in obeying the law of the land, so that the court enforces the law fairly in the public interest, but with due respect for individuals.

BERNARD S. KAHN, 47, of 29545 Sugar Spring, Farmington Township, Graduate of Wayne State University (BA), University of Missouri (BS) and Wayne State University (LL.B.). Past special assistant attorney general. Owns own law firm in Detroit.

DISTRICT JUDGE. A newly created court, the 47th Judicial District will serve both the city and township. The term of office is four years, and the salary has been set at \$27,500. Vote for one candidate. The two receiving the highest number of votes in the primary will be opponents for election in November.

There are four candidates in the race although the names of five will be on the ballot. The discrepancy is explained by the fact that Edward R. Reagan announced his withdrawal after the official deadline had passed.

The candidates were asked:

1. What background experience do you feel qualifies you for election to the bench?

2. What is your interpretation of the court's role in the over-all law enforcement structure?

1. I have had 20 years of trial experience in the various Courts of the State which include among others, Circuit Court and several of the County, Probate Court, Recorder's Court, Common Pleas Court, Workmen's Compensation Commission, and various administrative tribunals. I have had a relatively high degree of success as a general practitioner and trial lawyer. I have served as a Special Assistant Attorney General on special assignments from the State of Michigan. I am a student of the law and have never lost interest in keeping up with its socio-legal, political and historical changes. I feel that I am temperamentally suited to serve as a judge in the Farmington District Court and have a philosophy of flexibility where the changing law must be applied to today's problems.

2. It is my feeling that the Court must accommodate itself with other social agencies and the Judge presiding in the District Court should be able to cooperate with the designated youth agencies, family service agencies, agencies on alcoholism and the various forces that interact with the law.

I believe that the Court must be prepared to meet the challenge of today's complex society and must not take a rigid attitude nor succumb to extremism. The Court should not declare itself to be lenient nor strict but must adopt either role or a middle ground where the circumstances dictate the necessity of doing so. Youthful offenders should not be coddled nor should an example be made of them. Crimes involving violence or brutality to an individual should be dealt with sternly and swiftly. Opportunities for rehabilitation for those who show an inclination to help should be taken by the Court.

torney for the federal government, as a staff attorney for the Grand Trunk Western Railroad. During this period I have tried scores of important cases in 18 Michigan counties, our federal courts and courts in Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Kentucky. I have also engaged in extensive appellate work in both our Michigan Appeals and Supreme Courts, and the U.S. circuit courts of appeal in Ohio and Illinois.

In addition to these legal qualifications, I have always been very active in civic, church and government affairs where I have lived, being president of both of the community organizations and on the P.T.A. board of directors. I served several years on the Redford Township, Drain Commission, and the Farmington Township Planning & Commission. For about five years I have been a very active trustee on the progressive Farmington Township Board.

2. I believe that our new court will have a real opportunity to greatly improve the quality of justice in our community. To do this our new judge must be both a leader for and a servant of our citizens. It is essential that he fairly and impartially, but firmly and fearlessly, enforce both civil and criminal laws. The court must recognize, but not over-emphasize, the technical rights of an individual accused of a criminal offense. It must also give equal consideration to the rights of the law-abiding public and constructively take the law violator responsibility to the law by firm and just treatment.

In order to do this, I feel that there must be established within the court the type of program - rehabilitation program used so successfully in Royal Oak, where dedicated, retired persons wage a tremendous effort against crime at very little cost to the community.

I further believe that it is the proper role of the court to vigorously marshal the schools, churches and service organizations in the community in a crime prevention program by teaching understanding of, and respect for the law. In my judgment, the judge of this court should not play the mere role of a second guesser, or "Monday morning quarterback," and only criticize and punish members of our society by passing judgment on civil and criminal matters. His role, I believe, also demands that he be an efficient, vigorous and understanding human deeply involved in the affairs of our community and efforts to correct our shortcomings.

EDWARD R. REAGAN, On July 22, 1968, announced his withdrawal from the race for district judge. However, because of the time element his name will continue to appear on the ballot.
