1. I believe the experience I have had in the county treasurer's office certainly qualifies me for this office. In other words 30 years employment, the last 14 years a Chief Deputy Treasurer, should be considered in selecting the county treasurer.

2. I will always consider and operate the county treasurer's office as a public trust. I will endeavor to give courteous and efficient service to the public to the best of my ability.

Prosecutor

RICHARD D. KUHN, 38, of Waterford Township, Attended Albion College and graduate of Michigan State University (B.A.) and Detroit College of Law (LL.B.). Served as legal counsel for the Special Senate Committee to Investigate the Detroit Newspaper Strike; and was an elected delegate to the Constitutional Convention.

1. I believe I am qualified for the office because of my experience as a practicing attorney for the past eight and a half years. As a practicing attorney, I have had experience in all phases of the law. I

believe that I have a reputation for being a "fighter" for the rights of the citizens of Michigan. For example, I am now fighting the State in my challenge to the unconstitutional denial by the state of the citizens' right to vote on the recent State Income Tax. Another important qualification is my integrity and character.

2. I think the most important thing for any elected official to do is to follow the constitution and statutes of the United States as well as the State of Michigan. In so doing I would be fulfilling the wishes of the public. Another important step would be to have good communication with the general public and thus insure responsiveness to their needs. The door to my office would be open to any and all citizens at all times.

JOHN N. O'BRIEN, 38, of Berkley, Graduate University of Detroit College of Commerce and Finance and University of Detroit Law School. Advanced studies at Northwestern University Criminal Defense Seminar. Appointed Assistant Oakland County Prosecutor in 1960. Left in 1962.

Sheriff

HERBERT G. COLLEY, 47, of Waterford Township. A sergeant on the Pontiac Police force since 1958, he has served in the patrol division traffic bureau, vice squad and detective bureau before becoming a patrol supervisor. He is currently serving a four-year term on the Waterford Township Board of Trustees.

1. I believe that my 17 years of experience in all phases of law enforcement qualify me for the office of Oakland County Sheriff. While the time spent on the force is important, I believe that what I have learned is even more important. I feel that it is essential for law enforcement agencies to take advantage of every technological and sociological trend and advance, so as to progress with the times.

In accordance with this philosophy, I have completed college-level courses in modern law enforcement at Oakland University and other schools while on the job.

2. I would establish programs to deal with the juvenile crime problem and the problem of the alcoholic. These would be gear-

ed to rehabilitation rather than simply punishment. I might add that no juvenile bureau exists in the sheriff's department presently, and that alcoholics and persons arrested for drunk driving (many of whom are alcoholics) are merely jailed for a given period with felons and hardened criminals.

I would also take every possible step to raise the standards for officers of every level in the department so as to insure that present and future programs will be carried out with absolute professionalism.

FRANK IRONS, 49, of Pontiac, Sheriff of Oakland County since Jan., 1955. Was Chief of Police in Berkley for 30 years.

1. No answer.

2. The enforcement of peace under today's criminal laws is a challenge and due to changing conditions, it has made necessary the need for new training procedures. Sheriff's Deputies pass rigid examinations, then are given basic law-enforcement training and in-service training. This has been in effect for the past three years.

If elected, I will maintain cooperation with township, village, city and state police that now exists. Give the people of our county the law enforcement they are entitled to and can be proud of and keep the Sheriff's Department in step with the growth and progress of Oakland County.
