Highest Mark.

The highest mark in the history of incorporated banking in Michigan for the aggregate business of state banks was reached September 1, according to a report just issued by the state banking department. A gain of \$14,600,000 is shown over the highest mark preceding the recent panic and an increase of 26,800,000 over the lowest point recorded during the panic, and of this increase \$17,000,000 is in savings deposits alone. Banking Commissioner Zimmerman states that all of the state banks are in good condition and that their services are well maintained.

Since the first of this year, 25 state banks have been incorporated with a capital of 1/2 million dollars. One gratifying condition is made known in the statement that there has not been a single failure during the year of a state bank, and that all of them are showing unusual prosperity conditions.
