Defense wants alleged confessions thrown out in Stempel kidnap case

Attorneys for the two men accused of kidnapping 13-year-old Timothy Stempel are trying to have statements reportedly made by their clients after their arrests ruled inadmissible as evidence when the case goes to trial.

The statements—alleged to be con-fessions—were reportedly made on Nov. 14 by Darryl E. Wilson, 22, and Clinton Williams, 19.

Defense Attorneys Curtis Rundell of Southlield and Donald A Brown of Troy have filed motions before Dai-land County Circuit Court Judge John N O Brien for supression of the state-ments and the court set 9 am Finday Jan 9 to hear arguments on the twin motions.

During a pre-trial hearing on Dec 31, O'Brien said he would defer ruling on earlier defense motions to move the trial out of the Oakland County-Detroit area until after the admissibility of the defendants' statements is

Attorney L. Brooks Patterson said copies of the statements have been given to both defense attorneys. In addition, Patterson said he understood tage recorded interviews between the defendants and police estated. Wilson and Williams have been in custody since their arrests by FBI. Bloomtield Township and state police four days after the Nov. 10 addiction of the son of General Motors executive Robert C. Stempel and his wife. Patricia.

"We strongly oppose the reductions in the bonds." declared Patterson. "This was a deliberate, violent crime...not one of passion," he charged PATTERSON and the defense at-torneys indicated they would await the outcome of rulings on the motions before deciding whether to move for separate trials for the two defendants. As it stands now, both Williams and Wilson are named in the same charges. The defense has requested that the trial be moved out of Oakland 'be-cause of the saturation of publicity'.

O'Brien has lowered \$100,000 bonds
against both defendants to \$50,000
cash and surety bonds, and, last
Wednesday, denied a motion by Prosecuting Altorney Patterson to restore
them to the original amount.

Rundall and Brown also have argued that the defendants, both black, would be unable to have a "jury of their peers" with a panel selected in "white, high-income, middle-class Oakland County."


PATTERSON said the state is op-posed to a change in verue in the case because of the inconvenience and additional cost to taxpayers of moving the trial out of the county.

"We should at least attempt to seat a jury here and see what happens be-fore deciding to go elsewhere," said Patterson.

Rundell and Brown said they understood the families of their clients were attempting to raise bond money for the release of the pair. "But #s a lot of money for these people to raise." said Rundell

Timothy Stemple was abouted early in the evening of Nov 10 while skateboarding near his Chisbenn Trail home in Bloomfield Township. It was held in the trust of a car more than two days and released after a \$150.000 ransoom was delivered.


