Kids and TV are topic

"Don't Allow Your Child to Become A Sponge" will be presented Saturday, Jan. 17, by the Committee for Children's Television (CCT).

Featured speaker at the 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. symposium will be Nat Rutstein who has worked in network television for 15 years. The symposium will be at Groves High School, Evergreen and Thirteen Mile roads.

Featured at the symposium will be four plays speaking to the over-involvement of children and television. Called "Fantasies" and written as a spoof, the plays were conceived by Martha Keller, children's television producer and advocate of wholesome television for youth.

Assisting Mrs. Keller were Janet Flueter, Callie Schmidt and Margaret Thorpe. Eight students from Covington Junior High School, directed by their teacher, Jennifer Strang, will perform in the tales.

Resource consultants for the program will be: Dr. Joan Chodoroff,

head psychologist at the Down River Guidance Clinic, who also has a private practice in Birmingham; Clifford Curley, assistant program manager for Channel 7; Jan Lambright, president of the Kalamazoo Children's Commission for Television; and John Able of the department of telecommunication at Michigan State University.

THE STUDENT troupe will be available to tour area schools after the symposium.

Pre-registration for the symposium is recommended. The fee for the all-day program is \$4 including lunch. In his recently released book, "Go Watch TV," Rutstein says, "I do not view the television industry as an enemy. In fact, my hope is that people working in TV... will cooperate in creating programs that will not damage children but rather will aid in their development as healthy human beings."

Rutstein is producing a series on ecology for public television. He also has served as Communications Consultant to the White House Conference on Children.

Prizes will be awarded during Southfield Founders Day. This is the first year the contest has been held. Student entries should be submitted to an English teacher in the school.

The 1975 financial records of the Oakland County road commission will be audited by the Southfield accounting firm of Plante & Moran for the second year in a row.

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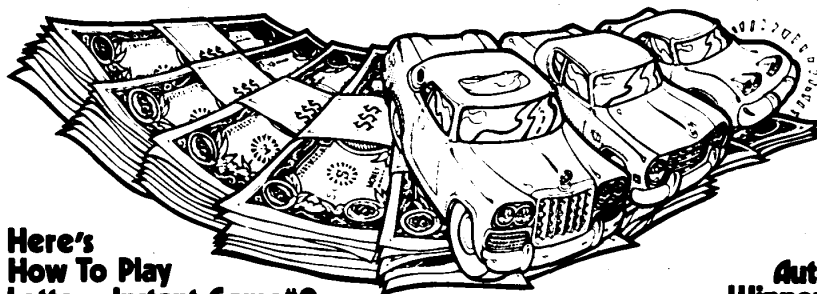


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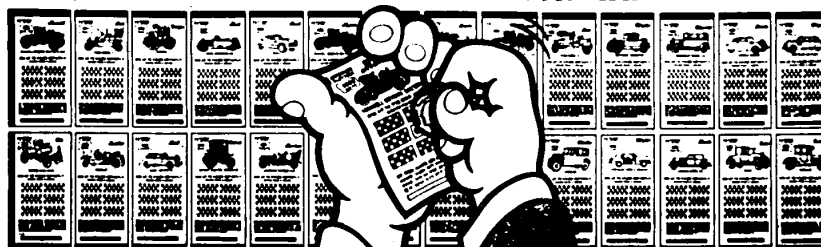
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
