**Microwave cookery is new class subject**

Microwave cookery will be the subject of four sessions conducted by Vincent A. McCallum in Farmington Community Center beginning Thursday, Feb. 12. Both morning and evening classes will be available.

This is the safest way to cook," McCallum explained, "because appliance specifications are so tightly controlled by the gov-

ernment. Conventional cooking methods account for 7,000 accidents yearly, while the only one from a microwave oven resulted when a man dropped it on his foot moving it out to the patio.

"Many ovens are now incorporating braile controls because it's impossible for blind persons to burn themselves cooking with microwaves," McCallum reported.

Lessons will begin with cooking of such elementary items as eggs, cupcakes, and muffins, and a description of accessories, both those that are helpful and those that are unnecessary.

This will be followed by instructions for making casseroles (with samples including granola-carrot cake, and Greek lemon soup. A two-ounce roast of beef, rare at one restaurant, was done at the other, also will be featured.

"Pies emerge in 10 minutes," continued McCallum. "We'll whip one up that layers itself into crust, custard and coconut. Then we'll go on to rock Cornish hens with wild rice stuffing."

"After that, there'll be more information on vegetables, a section on almond-butter toffee, jams, jellies and drying spices."

The oven's use in special diets will conclude the series.

The instructor is general manager of McCallum Associates. His classes are purposefully flexible so that questions of members may be discussed. Reservations are being accepted at the center.
