Mothers' group sets conference

Mothers on the Move, a group that sponsors home-based classes for mothers, has scheduled a biennial conference March 22 and 23 in Cobo Hall, Detroit.

Water James Dobson will be the main speaker, and the conference also will include a number of small groups led by speakers on educational, psychological and religious topics and a banquet for couples for the evening of March 22.

Mothers on the Move was founded by Marilyn Van Wingerden, who has been teaching and training teachers for mothers' classes for eight years. There are 23 such classes operating in the area.

The organization, said Mary Lou Flowers, vice-president, "believes that America's basic foundation is the family."

"We desire to help strengthen the family

by teaching a return to God's principles," she added. "We encourage women to build a secure family base."

Classes, she said, are based on "the practical application of scriptural principles as they relate to the wife and mother."

Dobson, main speaker for the conference, has as his theme "Freedom, Our Christian Heritage," is assistant professor of pediatrics at the University of Southern California school of medicine and director of behavioral research in the development division of Los Angeles Children's Hospital.

He has written several books, including "Dare to Discipline," "Hide and Seek," "What Wives Wish Their Husbands Knew about Women."

He has appeared on network television with Barbara Walters, Tom Snyder and Dinah Shore.

The small group sessions include "Developing Emotional Stability," led by John Powell, Michigan State University faculty member; "Fulfilled Wife, Happy Husband," led by the Rev. Paul Bernice, pastor and counselor in Farmington; "School Pressures: Teaching Your Child to Cope," led by Jacquelyn Tills, Wayne State University faculty member; and "Freedom to Influence the Family," led by Debbie Arnold.

Other topics are "Freedom to be Me."
