

Local Option in Oakland

Misrepresentation indulged in by the brewery representative, who recently dealt with the prohibition question in Oakland county caused an evangelical minister to make the statement that bank deposits in the city of Pontiac have increased \$165,000 under the local option regime. We believe that the misrepresentation indulged in by liquor interests with regard to conditions in the county has materially weakened their cause. But, at the same time, the enthusiastic supporter of local option has given juggling figures also to carry his point. It therefore behoves the citizens of this county, who will from time to time be deluged with statements, pro and con on this question, to take them with a grain of salt. It is true that the deposits have increased under local option, but such increase is due to recovery from the panic which was participated during October, 1907. On August 28, of that year the deposits in the four banks of Pontiac totalled \$5,310,758.35 and this was during the license regime. This figure is greater by \$48,880.50 than is at present represented. It will thus be seen that the unreasonable pro-saloonist, who wished to take advantage of the facts as stated could easily draw the conclusion that under license deposits were even more plentiful than now. It is well for both the elements of this controversy to be more careful in their statements. The great middle class is doing its own thinking and statements which depart from the truth are not apt to go unchallenged.

Another Change.

Another change has been made by the postal department at Washington, D. C., relative to the sending of postal cards through the mail. The law definitely states that all cards bearing glass, metal, mica, sand, tinsel, or any similar substance will be unmailable, except in envelopes, sealed tightly, so that any falling particles of the cards cannot come out, or unless they are arranged so as to prevent any possible objectionable substance from being rubbed off. The order is an important one as there are any number of such cards passing through the department every day. Another law which the public should bear in mind is that the envelopes inclosing the postals must have a two-cent stamp.

The Local Paper.

Interesting figures compiled by M. W. Lawrence, proprietor of two farm journals circulating in Ohio and Michigan, show that 77 1-2 per cent of the farmers of these states do not take any of the popular national magazines. In other states, Mr. Lawrence believes this percentage will be found even greater, says the *Attica* (N. Y.) Advertiser.

In many communities the local paper must be the only reading matter that enters the home. In some cases it is everything, from cook book to bible. Such a paper must exercise a tremendous influence on the public opinions and the "buying public."

The local merchant often fails to see that he has right at hand the means of combating mail order houses. An advertisement in his local paper will carry more weight than all the catalogues and national advertising that a mail order house puts out.
