

Fate of Israel set for debate

The fate of Israel and American Jews will be the topic of discussion at three programs to be sponsored by Adat Shalom Synagogue, 3801 Middle Belt, Farmington.

The discussions will be on Mondays at 8:15 p.m. March 1, 8 and 22. Rabbi Seymour Rosenbaum, associate rabbi of Adat Shalom, will act as moderator for the series which is sponsored by

the Adult Study Commission of the congregation. Each evening will open with a presentation by a specialist in the issue under discussion. Following responses by a panel of

members from the community, the discussion will be open to the floor for questions.

On March 1, Dr. Zvi Gileman, associate professor of political science at the University of Michigan, will open a discussion of "What Right Does Israel Have to Exist?" Panel members will be Yoram Dahav, doctoral candidate at Wayne State; Rabbi James Gordon of Young Israel of Oak Woods; and Kenneth Stein, a lecturer in the department of history at U.M.

On March 8, David Cohen, assistant vice president of B'nai B'rith in New York, will discuss "How Can We Relate as Jews to an Increasingly Secular and Non-ideologically Oriented Israeli Society?" Panel members will be Harold Gales, vice president of the American Jewish Committee in Detroit and past president of the Jewish People's Institute; Gordon Silverman, director of the Labor Zionist Organization; and Rabbi Gerald Teller, director of education and youth at Congregation Shaarey Zedek.

At the concluding session on March 22, Rabbi Joel Poupko, director of the Hillel Foundation, University of Michigan, will speak on "What would happen to Judaism if the State of Israel were destroyed?" Panel members will be Abraham Aharon, masters student in educational psychology at Wayne State; Michael Brody, doctoral candidate in the department of history at the University of Michigan; and Rabbi Milton Rosenberg of Temple Emanu-El.
