

Private tennis clubs form competitive league

Oak Park Racquet Club players won 18 of 24 matches over the Rochester Hills Racquet Club team to score a 220-154 victory Saturday at Rochester, in Metro Tennis League action.

Oak Park men won 11 of 12 matches, while the women's squad was victorious in seven of 12 matches.

In the doubles competition, the Oak Park men again proved dominant, winning all four matches. The women split their matches, each team winning twice.

At the conclusion of seven matches, the Court House Tennis and Racquets Club has a commanding lead over all other participating clubs.

League officials expect Court House, which has dominated play through the early part of the season, to finish in first place.

Oak Park and Rochester Hills are vying for second place in the Metro Tennis League. The clubs are separated by only 10 points after playing nine matches.

Rochester Hills leads the battle for second place with 184, while Oak Park dramatically cut the Rochester lead last weekend's victory. Oak Park now has 180 points.

Both Oak Park and Rochester Hills have only one league match left to play this season. Rochester plays a 7 p.m. game with I-49 leading Court House on April 3, while Oak Park travels to an 8 p.m. contest at Franklin, the same night.

After seven matches, Franklin is in last place.

Oak Park could conceivably hold onto second place after the Franklin battle. Rochester Hills has the tough task of holding off Oak Park in the standings while playing the league leaders.

There will be a play-off match for the league champions between the first- and second-place teams after the regular season has been concluded.

The site and date of the play-off match will not be determined until the league standings are final.

Formed in 1973 by the Square Lakes Racquet Club, Centaur Farm Racquet Club, Rochester Hills Racquet Club and the Oak Park Racquet Club, the Metro Tennis League's purpose is to promote com-

petitive tennis among the top players in each of the respective clubs.

"Not only has this been accomplished," league secretary-treasurer Mark S. Conu said, "but the clubs as a whole take an active interest in their teams' standings and also turn out for many of the matches in support of their team."

This year's league is comprised of six clubs after the addition of Court House Tennis and Racquets Club and the Franklin Racquet Club.

Each Metro Tennis League team plays two matches against each of the participating clubs, one home and one away. The team accumulating the highest game victories in a match is the winner.

Teams are comprised of eight men and eight women players. Each player competes in one singles and one doubles match.

Singles matches are played on the basis of only two sets, while the player wins the most number of games considered the winner. If there is a tie after two sets, a nine-point tie breaker is then played to determine the winner.

All doubles matches are eight-game pro sets.

If a team match is tied after completion of all scheduled rounds, a mixed doubles match would be played to determine the match winner.

Hockey player is All-American

Mike Stusick, a Lake Forest College senior from Southfield, has been named to the All-American hockey team for the third straight year.

Stusick, the only player in the history of college to score more than 100 goals, was honored recently at a banquet at the Bismarck Hotel in Chicago.

"Stusick has been a consistently fine performer," said Lake Forest coach Charlie Morrison. "He's the best player I've coached in my 16 years of hockey. Mike's very deserving of the All-American honor. He's worked hard all year in practice, and he's played hard during the games."

Stusick was injured near the end of the season and "this made a big difference in our last two games," according to Morrison. Lake Forest dropped its final two games and finished with a 14-18 record.

Stusick led the Lake Forest team in both goal production and point total. He was one of 12 players named to the Midwest Division II All-American team.

Colombari Center is just off the I-75 expressway, a 30-minute drive from Birmingham. For information about the retreat, call Mrs. Rosen, 352-2280.

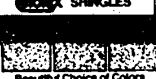
