# SEMTA To Study Commuter Transit

A study designed to put more suburban jobs within reach of inner city residents will be conducted by SEMTA (Southeastern Michigan Transportation Authority).

Another goal of the study will be to evaluate the future of commuter train service.

SEMTA has announced receipt of a \$40,000 grant from the U.S. Transportation Department. Another \$20,000 in local funds will help finance the study.

The new study is an extension of a report released April 30 which recommended that SEMTA acquire eight buslines, including Detroit's DSR and the privately-owned Northville Coach Line, and run them on a unified six-county basis.

Recommendations are expected in about six months.

TWO GOALS are set for the study, according to Dr. Wilbur R. Thompson, chairman of the authority board and a professor of economics at Wayne State University.

"Recommendations will be developed for immediate improvements in bus service between the inner city, which has the highest percentage of residents without cars, and suburban employment generators," he stated.

The Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce will cooperate in the bus phase of the study, which resulted in part from difficulties encountered in the Chamber's efforts to find jobs for inner city residents.

ONE DAILY ROUND trip commuter train is operated between Detroit and Ann Arbor by the Penn Central.

The Penn Central is under orders from the Interstate Commerce Commission to continue the Ann Arbor-Detroit service until October 1969. Then it may petition the Michigan Public Service Commission to drop it.

The B&O-C&D recently discontinued all but one leg of its two daily commuter round trips between Detroit and Plymouth, leaving only one evening train to Plymouth.

AMONG THE ITEMS to be studied is the feasibility of providing passenger train service between Metropolitan Airport and downtown Detroit on the existing tracks of the Norfolk and Western Railroad.

Dr. Thompson outlined plans for the study at a conference at Metropolitan Airport.

Various public officials have cited the need for rapid transit to serve the airport because of the huge influx of travelers expected when the 400-passenger "jumbo" jets begin operating next year.

The Norfolk and Western tracks run from the Port St. station through Melvindale, Allen Park, Taylor, Romulus, Belleville and Milan, passing within a mile of the airport terminal complex.

At present, the only passenger train on that line is the famous Wabash Cannonball, which operates between Detroit and St. Louis, Mo. The train does not stop until it reaches Adrian. The railroad has petitioned the Interstate Commerce Commission (ICC) for permission to discontinue the train.

SEMTA is a six-county agency established by the State Legislature to plan, develop and operate a regional public transportation network, using buses and rapid transit. It encompasses the counties of Macomb, Monroe, Oakland, St. Clair, Wayne and Washtenaw.
