

IN THE POCKET

For the first time in the history of the Detroit Bowling Association it will have an Observerland bowler as its president.

At the annual meeting of the club sponsors this Sunday afternoon Leonard Schemanske, of Livonia, will be elevated to the presidency for a one-year term, in the regular election of the officials.

Doris Krause and Doris O'Brien, both well known in Observerland, turned in the best performance of the Detroit group in the doubles with 1199. Elvira and Anita teamed off for 1101, while Carol Schemanske and Neary Hiter combined their efforts for an 1188.


