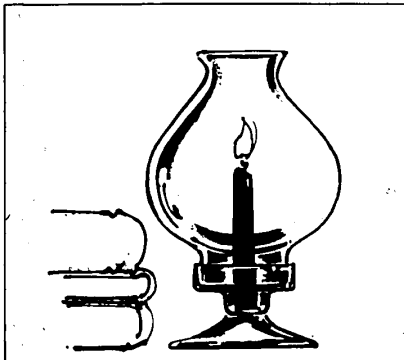

The show will feature 25 antique dealers with china, silver, glass, jewelry and other.

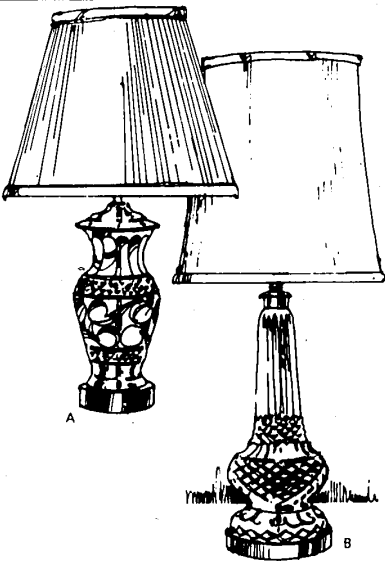
