In the women's leagues, much of the latest hunt has been brought about by the Ladies Major League switch of "home" lanes from Pine Tree Bowl on the west side to Luxury Lanes on the east side.

The girls claim that the 3:30 p.m. starting is much too late and the west side—among them Ann Setlock, the former bowling queen—are leaving the league.

Among the new women's teams will be one being put together by Mary Mahoney, another former queen, and Bonnie Barnes and they hope to make a strong bid for the title.
