May wine is spring's sure sign



Rise up, maidens, tie for shame! For I've been four long miles from home. I've been gathering garlands gay. Rise up fair maidens, take in your May.

—Old English folk song from New Castle-upon-Tyne

'Tis the Lusty Month of May, and once again it's time for that delicious May Wine that is traditionally drunk on May Day and for any other May festivity. Here are two recipes, both are excellent, but the second one is quicker to make and far more potent.

Sweet woodruff can be found in most health food stores. (It is sometimes called Master of the Woods.) In Europe this herb was looked upon as the symbol of springtime. It has a fresh, clean smell much like new mown hay. Housewives used to tie herbs and potpourris.

By itself, woodruff can be brewed to make a relaxing yet uplifting tea.

MAY WINE
(A Very Old German Recipe)
Place a small bunch of dried sweet woodruff, five or six sugar cubes and two slices each of lemon and orange in the bottom of a quart jar. Then fill the jar with Rhine wine. Allow it to steep from 2-3 days. Tasting it daily, strain off the lemon, orange and woodruff when the desired flavor is obtained.

MAY WINE
(Recipe No. 2)
My Own Favorite

1 cup sweet woodruff (dried)
1 cup brandy
1 cup granulated sugar
1 bottle dry white wine
Fresh strawberries
Mix the first three ingredients, cover and let stand overnight. Then strain and squeeze out all the liquid, not wasting a drop. Add the liquid to the wine. Serve chilled and garnish with fresh strawberries.

Drink it and dance around the Maypole.

Delta Kappa marks anniversary

On the anniversary of their initiation, first-year members of Beta Eta chapter of Delta Kappa Gamma, Carolyn McQuiggan, Nancy Simenak and Joan Courville, will welcome Jill Turley and Myrna Henderson into membership.

Delta Kappa Gamma is an international honorary society for outstanding women educators, as witnessed by the accomplishments of the members. Beta Eta chapter of Michigan Alpha Iota includes a number of women educators from the Farmington-Clareville area.

Mrs. Courville has been a speech and language pathologist in the Farmington school system since 1963. She is chairman of the department and has trained student teachers from many universities during the course of her service. She is active in Michigan and American Speech and Hearing Associations.

Mrs. Simenak is a first grade teacher in Fairview Elementary School. She has trained a student teacher every year since she qualified for student teaching supervision. She has served on the Farmington school's curriculum study committee and has been teacher representative in the Parent Teachers Association. She takes a special interest in science, ecology and outdoor education.

Mrs. McQuiggan is a fourth grade teacher in Ten Mile School and has taught in Farmington since 1968. She is active in the Farmington Hills Beautification committee and the Farmington Historical Society. She is a charter member and officer of the Farmington Naturalist Club, and was instrumental in the initiation of the program "Emphasis on Environmental Education," in her school and in the Farmington district.

Mrs. Turley is a counselor at Harrison High School, and organized that department after transferring from East Junior High School when Harrison opened in 1970. She is in charge of the testing and scholarship programs there, and a member of the Drug Abuse Committee, the Farmington Hills Sweet Adelines and 600 Club.

Mrs. Henderson is a speech pathologist for the Farmington Schools. She is a former fifth grade teacher in Novi, and began the speech program in Lapeer, in 1967. She conducts workshops in speech and language for classroom teachers, is active in church and community affairs, and assists her husband, Gil, who is mayor of Novi.

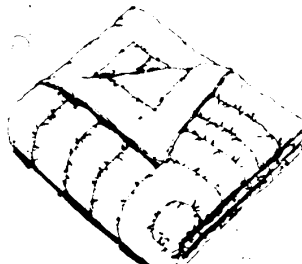

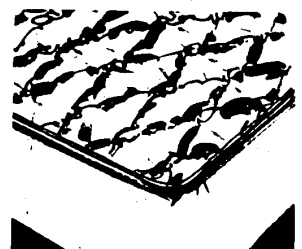

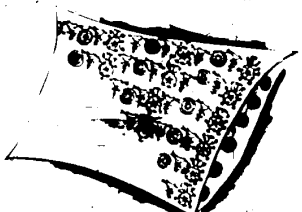
