

# Palette and Brush show opens May 16

Three women from the Farmington-Southfield area are heavily involved in the planning and preparation of the annual Palette and Brush Club art show. The show, May 18-22, will be held at the Scarab Club, 217 Farmington, Detroit. The opening reception will be 2-5 p.m. Sunday, May 18. Mrs. Agnes Meregian of Southfield is

general chairman of this 30th annual exhibition. Working with her are Mrs. Lou Gaddis of Farmington Hills (publicity) and Wanda Northen, president of the 125 member group.

Detroit artist Charles McGee will judge the show. He studied at Detroit Society of

Arts & Crafts from 1947-1957 and at the School of Graphics in Barcelona, Spain in 1958. Since 1959 he has been assistant professor of art at Eastern Michigan University. He also operates Gallery 7 in the Faber Building in Detroit. His work is part of the permanent collection of the Detroit Institute of Arts.

The first prize will be the "Made Robson" traveling trophy valued at \$50 award. The second prize is \$25 and the third prize \$20. Ribbons will be given prize winners as well as those receiving honorable mentions.

## March aids search for asthma care

A door-to-door "March for Breath" campaign, sponsored by the Metropolitan Detroit Chapters for the National Asthma Center, and Children's Asthma Research Institute and Hospital (CARHI) will take place during the entire month of May.

Proceeds will go to the center in Denver, Colo. for the treatment and care of children suffering from crippling intractable asthma, and to support the world-known research program into the causes and a possible cure for asthma and related allergic diseases.

The center treats children from every corner of the United States, and from foreign countries as well. Patients are accepted without regard to race, creed, religion or their ability to pay. The only criterion for admission is medical necessity.

Among the leaders of the March for Breath campaign are Mrs. Elsie Landberg of Southfield, president, Mrs. Sandra Iwrey of Oak Park, president of Elaine Levin Chapter, Mrs. Ernestine Meadow of Livonia, president of Northwest Detroit Chapter and Michael Olat of Detroit, president of Greater Dearborn Chapter.

Newest addition to the services offered by the center is the establishment of an Outpatient Consultative Service open to adults and children alike. This service is available on the same basis as the residential care program.

Asthma can be a big disease for many little people. Children suffer physically, emotionally, socially and academically, and every effort is made to help the children return to a normal life in their family and community.

Some 9,000,000 Americans suffer from asthma and more than half of them are children.

Cost of care for each child at the center is now in excess of \$21,500 per year.
