Morrison, Bentley Add Laurels

KALAMAZOO—More honors came to John Morrison of Redford Union High and the mile relay team of Livonia Bentley High in the annual Champion of Champions prep track meet here on Memorial Day.

Morrison, the state's premier hurdler, ran his final races as a prep in Michigan in spectacular style as he won the high hurdles in 14 seconds and the lows in 19.1 seconds.

He was hailed as the most valuable performer of the meet.

AS SPECTACULAR as Morrison was, Bentley's mile relay of Dan Koch, Mark Friedrichs, Tom Spuller and Joe Chermello was even more brilliant.

The Bentley foursome was nipped at the wire by Southgate in the fastest mile relay ever posted in the state:

Both schools were timed in 3:19.7, compared to the state record of 3:20.5 held by Ecorse.

Many experts thought the race was a dead heat, but the judges gave the victory to Southgate.

IN SETTING a Bentley school mark and making Bentley one of the few prep teams ever to beat the 3:20 barrier in the race, Koch ran the leadoff leg in 50.5 seconds.

Friedrichs was timed in 51.2 seconds and Spuller and Chermello both in 49 seconds flat. Redford Union came up with a pair of school marks.

Bob Junk was clocked in 9:34.8 in the two mile, compared to the old standard of 9:39.

The RU mile relay's time of 3:24.1 also was a school standard. Bob Kuhn, Gary McCausland, Greg Nelson and Jim Legana formed the team.

Thomas Esler -- tied for first in 50 yard dash, James Theobald -- tied for third in 50 yard dash.

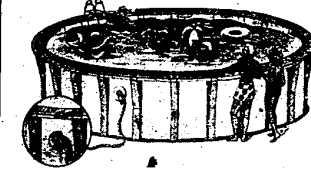
Karen Doll -- First in softball throw, Second in 100 yard dash, and second in 50 yard dash.

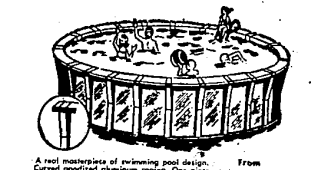
