1. As a **PRE-Smoker**. Place high-quality hardwood charcoal briquets in lower pan. Light. Put chunks of aromatic hardwood (mesquite, apple, pecan, cherry, etc.) in coals. Add water or desired liquids to water pan directly beneath grill. Place seasoned meat on grill and cover. Do not open during the cooking process. Consult cooking chart for proper timing amounts of water, briquets and wood chunks.

2. As a **Charcoal Grill**. Remove water pan. Adjust charcoal pan to notch on legs immediately beneath water pan level. To broil steaks, hamburgers, chicken, etc. place briquets in charcoal pan and grill meat after coals are well started. For tangy smoked flavor, add wood chunks and cover with lid.
