Greek festival coming June 18

You don't have to go all the way to downtown Detroit to experience that Greek feeling... at least not on June 18, 19 or 20. Then St. George Greek Orthodox Church will bring all that country's culture to Bloomfield Hills with its annual Greek festival "Ya-Soo" (to your health).

The three-day event promises to be filled with activity from the hour it opens on Friday evening to the last dance on Sunday afternoon.

The Village store will be stocked with Greek bread, Feta cheese, Kalamata Olives, Filo and many other items.

The Artifacts shops will combine two types of Greek craft work, rural and urban, in a display and sale of household utensils and fabrics, decorative items of wood, metal and clay.

For those who get thirsty or perhaps, wonder what the future holds, a cup of Greek coffee combines the solution for both. After the rich, dark coffee's gone and the grounds settle, readers will be on hand to interpret the sediment and guess your future.

In addition to all that, music and dancing will be ongoing, along with continual display of Greek costumes and clothing. Too, there will be a Greek cooking demonstration of dishes such as stuffed grape leaves, Typouros or Greek salad.

The demonstration times will be announced during the festival, but in case you miss one, festival planners have provided the a few recipes to try at home and perhaps, to whet the appetite for a day at the festival.

DIPLIS

- 4 whole eggs
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon softened butter
- 2 cups flour
- 1/2 teaspoon salt

Best eggs and add dry ingredients. If dough is too light, add a few drops of milk. If too soft, add a little flour. Roll out on floured board until almost paper thin, dusting with flour to keep from sticking. Cut into strips about two by eight inches. Drop into hot oil, holding dough in left hand. With fork in right hand, roll strip quickly like a jelly roll while frying before it becomes too crisp. Fry until lightly browned. When cool, dip into warm honey diluted with a little hot water and sprinkle lightly with cinnamon and ground nuts.

GREEK SALAD SUPREME (PSOLOMO-MENI)

- 1 clove garlic
- 1 head lettuce (shredded)
- 1/2 bunch endive (shredded)
- 1 tomato (quartered)
- 1 cucumber (sliced)
- 6 green onions (sliced)
- 3 stalks celery (diced)
- 1 slice Feta cheese
- 1 ripe olive (Kalamata)
- 1 green pepper (diced)
- 1 radishes (sliced)
- 1 carrot (shredded)
- 1 tablespoon parsley (chopped)
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- Olive oil and vinegar or lemon juice

1 cooked beet (sliced)
1 cup chick peas (cooked)

Rob salad bowl with garlic. Combine next 11 ingredients, season and toss with just enough oil to coat salad. Pour one-quarter as much vinegar as oil and toss lightly. Garnish with border of sliced beets and Feta cheese. Arrange olives in center and sprinkle chick peas over all. Serves eight.

Israel Bond Dinner to cite area man

Irwin Klar of Southfield will be honored by Congregation Beth Abraham-Hillel at an Israel Bond Dinner on June 24.

Klar is president of the West Bloomfield congregation.

"Whatever obligations we fulfill toward Israel does not fulfill our obligation to support her economic development by lending her funds through the purchase of Israel bonds," Klar said.

"State of Israel bonds are responsible for a major portion of what Israel has become since her independence 28 years ago in terms of industry and employment, roads, airports, railways, irrigation systems and public housing."

"If she is to continue to be a viable state, a homeland for all Jews and a beacon of pride in the hearts of us all, then we are obligated to put our dollars to work in Israel. When our money is returned, it will have earned us interest, but what we really earn is the right to say our Israel forever and always."

The honoree was born in Poland 64 years ago and moved to Detroit during World War I.

Southfield woman retires from JWF

Ida Levine, assistant controller of the Jewish Welfare Federation retired on May 28. She is a resident of Southfield.

Prior to her appointment as assistant controller, she has guided federation and United Jewish Charities in handling major gifts including stocks and real estate holdings. Miss Levine has also worked in the area of short term investments and was responsible for developing the statistical reports for the Allied Jewish Campaign Isreal Emergency Fund.

Under her supervision, federation's book-keeping systems have kept abreast of the new techniques introduced in the past several years according to Anna Chapin, federation's controller.

Miss Levine was given special recognition at the board of governors meeting of May 25. She was also cited by her colleagues at a reception in the home of JWF association director, Samuel Cohen.

"Ida is well-known to hundreds of our campaign workers who have been turning in their cards and solicitation results to her at innumerable campaign dinners and report meetings," said federation executive vice-president William Aronson, who is also retiring this month.
