A Public Hearing to confirm the special assessment roll for S&D No. 7644 Nine Mile Road Sanitar. Sewer was held. Confirmation of roll was laid until next regular meeting.

City Manager informed Council of SENIOR General Assembly Meeting to be held Thursday, June 16, 1976 at Redford Inn.

Council supported a Resolution adopted by the City of Oak Park opposing Senate Bills 181 and 129 and directed the City Manager to so inform our state legislators.

Council supported Oakland County Executive Daniel T. Murphy's opposition to House Bill 6018 regarding "Tax Base Sharing."

Mayor Richardson was appointed to represent the City of Farmington at the Michigan Municipal League Annual Business Meeting in Lansing on September 8th with City Manager as Alternate.

Says OCC prof Rock: You've got to smell it

A new course at OCC's Orchard Ridge campus, "History of Music: The Rock Era," always draws a full house.

Dr. Ted Mann, a verbal person with a heavy background in classical music, has been developing the course content for more than a year.

"I don't know of any college or university that offers this as a legitimate music course from the point of view of music history," he said.

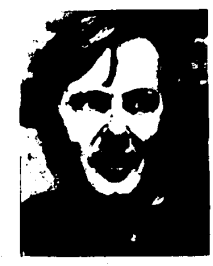
"Twentieth century popular music is an extremely important phenomenon and it has a proper place in history regardless of whether you like it or not."

After covering the pre-rock era, traditional pop music, country-western and the rhythm and blues of the late 40s and early 50s, Mann treats the rock era in detail.

"Each of these early forms offered certain things and provided the amalgam for rock."

Contrary to what many young people believe, the rock blues is not unique, Mann said.

"The 12-bar blues goes way back. It does the 32-bar popular song form. The one five two five one progression is in 'Swanee River' as well as 'Shades of Blue'."

Until five years ago, Mann's professional involvement with music was primarily classical, although he did play piano with a number of popular musical groups in the early 50s.

From a rather elementary form in those early days, rock has moved in some 20 odd years to a highly sophisticated musical art.

The level of musicianship began to increase noticeably, Mann said, when some of the phenomenal guitar players out of Nashville got into it.

When this happened, there was little room for the kind who could play a couple of strings on the guitar or who could hum a total musical experience was playing drums with the high school marching band.

While Mann believes that no top flight popular artist can match the musicianship of a top symphonic or classical artist, he said, "Rock musicians have to be highly skilled to make it today."

While many symphonic musicians make the transition to studio musicians for rock, few of the rock musicians could qualify for a major symphony, he said.

music to be of poor quality, but the performances of high quality."

What really happens at performances, however, can't be recorded. He uses concerts by the "Grateful Dead" in San Francisco as an example. "Unless you were there to experience the swell the mood of the crowd and its response to the music and what was happening on stage in addition to the music, you couldn't understand the whole effect."

Future generations won't be able to completely document or understand these concerts.

One of the differences between modern music and its ancestors is that before the rock era, most singers sang someone else's songs.

They were on stage singing someone else's love songs. They acted in love. They put on a presentation.

In the 1960s, Mann said, when musicians began singing their own songs, it was real. The song was something the vocalist had experienced.

This is one reason why Bob Dylan is so important.

From the days of Bill Haley and the Comets through Elvis Presley, Fast Eddie, Peter Paul and Mary, the twist, protest song and acid rock to the present—it is all in the new course.

More than just a history of music, it provides an understanding and feeling for the troubled years in which so many changes have taken place.
