

# DeLapp qualifies in amateur tournament

Barry DeLapp of Farmington Hills outlasted 350 other state golfers to qualify for the quarter-final round of match play in the 68th Michigan Amateur Golf Tournament last week in Charlevoix.

DeLapp shot a 69 and 77 for a 146 in a 36-hole tournament opening round Wednesday, qualifying him for a bid in the state amateur crown against 350 golfers.

Thursday morning he defeated Leo Pucki of Romulus, 3-2, in match play and went on to crush Mark Spiekerman in the afternoon round, leading his Saginaw opponent by six strokes with five holes to play.

In match play, each golfer is pitted against the other and the winner of the round moves on to the next, while the loser plays his bags for home.

Once a golfer pulls ahead of his opponent by an unbreakable lead, play for that round ends.

In Friday's action, DeLapp best Gary Domagalski of East Lansing by one stroke after 18-holes. Later in the afternoon, he took to the course in the quarter-final round against Bob Prosen of Detroit.

MIKE KERR of Livonia lost to Rick Versore of Pontiac in quarter-final match play by five strokes with three holes to play.

To qualify for that round, Kerr defeated Bob Bell of Oxford by one stroke in a 36-hole playoff.

Kerr placed in the top seven Wednesday afternoon in the opening round of the tournament with a 74-70-104.

Kerr also defeated Gordon Kestelick of Oxford, again after two extra holes, to advance to his match against Bell.

Semi-final and final rounds were played Saturday and Sunday at the Belvedere Golf Club in Charlevoix, host of this year's amateur tournament.

Before Domagalski was pitted against front-runner DeLapp, he outplayed Peter Green, another Franklin Park, and had a tough time beating the local Itascaan.

Domagalski finally got the match out of Green's grasp in the final three holes of the 18-hole round, finishing two and one.

University of Michigan assistant golf coach Jim Lape of Ann Arbor knocked off Bud Stevens of Livonia, the only former Michigan Amateur champion remaining in the competition Thursday morning.

Stevens lost to Lape after 36 holes by one stroke in the match play.

In the open rounds Wednesday it looked as if Tom Rex Jr. of Franklin Park, champion at the Plum Hollow Golf Club in the tournament near the top, he entered the clubhouse that night with a 71-70-111 stood enough to put him in fourth place.

But Rex was defeated Thursday morning by Bob Bernstein of Grand Blanc, one up.

## Alexander invited to golf invitational

Detroit Country Day School announced that one of its students, Glenn Alexander of Southfield, has been invited to participate in the East Aurora Country Club International Junior Golf Invitational Tournament, June 28-July 2.

He will be the only student from Michigan attending the golfing event, now the oldest one of its kind in North America.

A three-day contest, it is probably the only PGA member club-sponsored competition of the kind in America.

Glenn, who will be a senior in September, has had an outstanding scholastic and athletic career at Detroit Country Day.

He was named Summa Cum Laude Form V and VII (grades 9 and 11) and Magna Cum Laude Form VI (grade 10).

He has played varsity baseball and hockey for three years, during which time he was named all-star goalie by the Detroit News for both 1974-75 and 1975-76.

He has played varsity football two years and last year was chosen most valuable golfer by his teammates. As captain of the

first year team, he led Country Day to the Class C state championship.

He also was chosen for the all-metro golf team by the Detroit News.

This June he received the DCSA Athletic Cup as the upper school's most outstanding athlete.

In 1966, after Gary Player made a generous cash gift to the USGA for the benefit of junior golf in America, the East Aurora Invitational committee dedicated the Gary Player Cup in his honor to be awarded the tournament's medalist.

The selection committee tries to feature top-caliber players from the South, East, Midwest and parts of Canada. The committee is striving for a worldwide showcase junior field of the highest caliber.

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## Novice tennis tourney slated

It's tennis tournament time again in the Farmington community.

The Farmington Area Recreation Commission will sponsor the Farmington Founders Day Festival Open and Novice Tennis Tournament July 24, 25, 26 and August 1.

SEALED BIDS for the purchase of the above bonds will be received by the undersigned at City Hall, 3186 Eleven Mile Rd., Farmington Hills, Michigan on Wednesday, the 18th day of July, 1976, until 2:00 o'clock, P.M., Eastern Standard Time, at which time and place bids will be publicly opened and read.

BOND DETAILS: Said bonds will be coupon bonds of the denomination of \$5,000 each, dated January 1, 1976, maturing in even order of maturity from 1 up to and including their last interest from their date payable on October 1, 1976, and semi-annually thereafter.

Said bonds will mature on the 1st day of October, as follows:

\$13,000 in each of the years 1976 and 1977,  
\$20,000 in each of the years 1978 and 1979,  
\$25,000 in each of the years 1980 and 1981,  
\$28,000 in each of the years 1982 and 1983,  
\$28,000 in each of the years 1984 and 1985,  
\$28,000 in each of the years 1986 and 1987,  
\$28,000 in each of the years 1988 and 1989,

PREPAYMENT: Bonds maturing prior to October 1, 1982, shall not be subject to redemption prior to maturity. Bonds maturing on and after October 1, 1982, shall be subject to redemption prior to maturity at the option of the holder by the City of Farmington Hills, at any time and from time to time, by paying to the holder, in cash, the principal and accrued interest to the date fixed for redemption, plus a premium as follows:

7% of the par value of each bond called for redemption on or after October 1, 1982, but prior to October 1, 1983,  
2% of the par value of each bond called for redemption on or after October 1, 1983, but prior to October 1, 1984,  
1% of the par value of each bond called for redemption on or after October 1, 1984, but prior to maturity.

Thirty days notice of redemption shall be given by publication, at least once, in a newspaper or publication circulated in the State of Michigan, which carries as part of its regular service, notice of sale of municipal bonds. Bonds called for redemption shall not bear interest after the redemption date; provided funds are on hand with the paying agent to redeem the same.

INTEREST RATE AND BIDDING DETAILS: The bonds shall bear interest at a fixed rate not exceeding 10% per annum, to be fixed by the bond tender, expressed in multiples of 1/8% of 1%. The interest on any one bond shall be at one rate only, all bonds maturing in any one year must carry the same interest rate and each coupon period shall be represented by one interest coupon. None of said bonds shall bear interest at a rate per annum which is less than 8% of the rate borne by any other bonds. No proposal for the purchase of less than all of the bonds or at a price less than 100% of their par value will be considered.

PAYING AGENT: Both principal and interest shall be payable at a bank or trust company located in Michigan qualified to act as paying agent under State or United States law, to be designated by the original purchaser of the bonds, who may also designate a co-paying agent, which may be located outside of Michigan, qualified to act as paying agent under the laws of the State in which located or of the United States, both of which shall be subject to approval of the undersigned.

PURPOSE AND SECURITY: The bonds are to be issued pursuant to the authorization contained in Act 31, Public Act of Michigan, 1975 (First Extra Session), as amended for the purpose of defraying the cost of acquiring a maintenance building for the use of the City of Farmington Hills which has leased the said maintenance building from the Authority pursuant to a certain Full Faith and Credit Contract of Lease dated as of October 1, 1975. The said Contract of Lease requires the City to make cash rental payments to the Authority in such amounts as shall be sufficient to enable the Authority to pay the principal of and interest on the bonds as the same shall become due. The full faith and credit of the City have been pledged for the making of the cash rental payments and the City is obligated to pay the same, without limitation as to rate or amount, in addition to any other taxes which the City may otherwise be authorized to levy, in such amounts as shall be necessary for the making of such cash rental payments for the payment of the principal of and interest on the bonds and to maintain the said cash rental payments have been created by the bond authorizing resolution.

ADDITIONAL BONDS: For the terms upon which additional bonds of equal standing as to the cash rental payments may be issued, reference is made to the bond authorizing resolution.

GOOD FAITH: A certified or cashier's check in the amount of \$13,000 drawn upon an incorporated bank or trust company and payable to the order of the Treasurer of the Authority must accompany each bid in the form of a good faith bid on the part of the bidder, to be forfeited as liquidated damages if such bid is accepted and the bidder fails to take up and pay for the bonds. No interest shall be allowed on the good faith checks and checks of the successful bidders will be promptly returned.

## returned to each bidder's representative or by registered mail. The good faith check of each successful bidder will be immediately cashed and payment for the balance of the purchase price of the bonds shall be made at the closing.

AWARD OF BONDS: The bonds will be awarded to the bidder whose bid produces the lowest interest cost computed by determining, at the rate or rates specified in the bid, the total dollar value of all interest on the bonds from August 1, 1976 to their maturity and deducting therefrom any premium.

LEGAL OPINION: Bids shall be conditioned upon the unqualified approval of opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKean, Coffey & Moon, attorneys at Detroit, Michigan, a copy of which opinion shall be printed on the reverse side of each bond, and the original of which will be furnished without expense to the purchaser of the bonds at the delivery thereof.

CUSIP: CUSIP numbers will be imprinted on all bonds of this issue at the issuer's expense. An improperly imprinted number will not constitute basis for the purchaser to refuse to accept delivery.

DELIVERY OF BONDS: The Authority will furnish bonds ready for execution at its expense. Bonds will be delivered without expense to the purchaser at New York, New York, Chicago, Illinois, or Detroit, Michigan. The usual closing documents, including a certificate that no litigation is pending affecting the issuance of the bonds, will be delivered at the time of the delivery of the bonds. If the bonds are not tendered for delivery by twelve o'clock noon, Eastern Daylight Time, on the 60th day following the date of sale, or the first business day thereafter if said 60th day is not a business day, the successful bidder may on that day, or any time thereafter until delivery of the bonds, withdraw his proposal by serving notice of cancellation in writing, in which event the undersigned will return the bonds and promptly return the good faith deposit. Payment for the bonds shall be made in Federal Reserve Funds. Accrual interest to the date of delivery of the bonds shall be paid by the purchaser at the time of delivery.

Certain statutory notice of intent procedures, with which the opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKean, Coffey & Moon, the issuer has fully complied, are required with respect to the above bonds. The constitutionality of a notice of intent law was questioned by the plaintiff in the case of *City of Detroit v. City of Detroit*, 404 Mich. 600, 268 N.W.2d 800, 1978-1979, on the grounds that the law did not provide an adequate method of giving the notice to known persons. The Trial Court held the law unconstitutional and the Michigan Appeals Court, after reversing a previous contrary opinion, has held the law to be constitutional. On May 18, 1976 the Michigan Supreme Court denied plaintiff leave to appeal the final Appeals Court decision. The plaintiff on June 8, 1976 filed a petition for rehearing by the Michigan Supreme Court of its May 18, 1976 order, and if rehearing is denied, plaintiff could appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. It is, however, the opinion of Dickinson, Wright, McKean, Coffey & Moon that, if such a rehearing is granted or such an appeal is attempted, the present holding of constitutionality by the Michigan Courts will be sustained. Upon request by the successful purchaser of the above bonds, Dickinson, Wright, McKean, Coffey & Moon will furnish an opinion stating the foregoing. The non-litigation certificate for the bonds will except this case.

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
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


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
