# As crime rate soars, punishment drops

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Even the strongest threat will not deter some persons; therefore, the threat of punishment, while it controls crime, cannot eliminate it. Offenders already guilty of crimes obviously have not been deterred. Among them, the proportion of people who cannot be deterred at all may be high.

However, most people are deter-rable. Society could not function at all if the law did not directly and in-directly deter them from doing what it prohibits, whether it be something universally regarded as evil—e.g., murder—or something prohibited to secure some practical good, such as exceeding the speed limit, or prac-ticing medicine without a license.

The evidence, statistical and experimental, shows clearly that a higher probability of severe punishment effective periment of note. For example, the experiment of note, for example, the experimenters found that a credible hireat of punishment reduced cheating among college students by two-thirds, but moral exhortation was ineffective.

WHETHER THE CRIMINAL potential that more or less strongly inheres in all of us is activated depends on external as well as internal factors. Some people would become criminals under nearly any circumstances, they are internally driven to dely social rules.

The threat of punishment is thus only one of many factors influencing crime rates. But threats can be more easily controlled than, say, family dis-

easily controlled than, say, family dis-integration, which contributes impor-tantly to high crime rates. Some of the social changes from which improvement had been ex-pected have had no discernible effects on crime rates. Poverty and igno-

Yet the crime rate has risen. Educa-tion. too. has greatly increased, as has psychiatric care, but the crime rate has risen even more.

ON THE OTHER hand, rates of pun-ishment have decreased.

ON THE OTHER hand, rates of punishment have decreased.
Between 1960 and 1970, the crime rate (per 100,000 people) rose 144 per cent; the arres' rate did not keep pare—It nose only 31 per cent prison per 100,000 inhabitants in 1960, only 68 were in 1970. In other words, while crime rates went up, punishment rates went down.

The decline in punishment occurred in the face of accumulating scientific evidence (by Isaac Ehrlich and others) which shows (contrary to what had been believed among criminologist until about 10 years ago that repunishment can significantly reduce crime rates.

WHY, DESPITE rising crime rates, are convictions hard to obtain? Why are courts lenient, despite the fact that 50 per cent of all violent crimes are committed by persons out on probation, parole or bail?

One reason is that we have long accepted the generous idea that offenders are misguided or sick and could—and therefore should—be relabilitated rather than punished.

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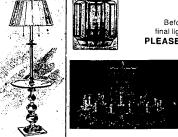
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
