FARC organizes discount ticket program

The Farmington Area Recreation Commission (FARC) in cooperation with the Michigan Recreation and Parks Association is sponsoring a discount ticket sales program for Bob-La, Cedar Point and Sea World through the summer months.

Tickets will go on sale May 2 at the City of Farmington finance department office, 2360 Liberty, and the Farmington Hills finance department office, 3535 Eleven Mile.

Selling prices for Bob-La are 50 cents below gate price at \$6 for children and \$7.50 for adults. The park is open from May 28-Sept. 5. Cedar Point tickets are \$6.10 for children and \$7.10 for adults, \$1.40 lower than gate price. Cedar Point is open May 14-Sept. 5.

Sea World tickets are \$1.50 for children and \$4.95 for adults, a reduction from their gate prices of \$4.25 and \$5.95 respectively. Sea World is open from May 28-Sept. 11. For further information, contact the FARC office at 474-6115.

Annual Ice show set for May 13, 14

Farmington residents will be among those who have volunteered their skills and time to help Novi figure skaters present their fourth annual ice show, "Fire and Ice." Performances are scheduled for 8 p.m. May 13, and at 1 p.m. and 7 p.m. May 14, at Novi Ice Arena, 42250 West Eleven Mile.

Volunteers have helped the skaters by sewing costumes, building props, and making posters. Most volunteers are parents, friends, and neighbors of skaters.

Each spring, the students, who take lessons year-round at the arena, culminate their classes with a musical revue. This year's show will feature 100 skaters, age three to 50. "Skating before an audience helps the students develop confidence in themselves," says Janis Fidler, head pro of the arena. "It's gratifying to see some students, who are with us for the second or third year, develop as skaters and performers."

The show's 26 numbers are divided into three acts. "Fire and Ice," which contrasts hot and cold things such as the tropics and the arctic, is the opening act.

The second act presents highlights from the children's favorite, "Peter Pan." The third act, entitled "Don't Let It Go," consists of several short numbers including one entitled "Oh, You Beautiful Doll," in which skaters will use life-sized dolls attached to their skates.

With each succeeding year, returning parents and staff have developed their own particular specialties. Naomi Miller of Southfield outlines the show and selects the music. Jane

Purdy of Livonia creates the headpieces which are designed along with all the costumes by Marge Miller of Southfield.

Melissa O'Rear of Novi designs the program cover and posters while the choreography is done by Janis Fidler of Oak Park with the assistance of instructors Debbie Smith, Naomi Miller, and Jessica Bacsanyi.

Tickets are priced at \$2.50 for adults and \$1.50 for children. They will be on sale at the arena. Further information may be obtained by calling the arena at 349-9180.

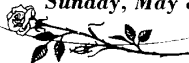
