Inmates prepare braille U-M maps

Incoming students have a difficult enough time finding their way around the University of Michigan campus. For blind students, a new college envi-ronment presents an even greater challenge. \(\)

challenge. The service of the Ann Arbor Lion's Club and the Braille Transcribing Unit at Jackson State Prison, blind students will now have an easier time getting the "feet" of the U-M campus. The two groups Thursday donated 20 braille maps of the university for use by blind students.

The maps, coded in braille and con-taining three-dimensional releiefs of roads, sidewalks and buildings throughout the entire 2,579-acre Ann Arbor campus, were produced by the Braille Transcribing Unit at Jackson State Prices

"The maps which are being presented to the university are believed to be the most comprehensive and largest braille maps in the world." said Albert Watson, program manager of Disabled Student Services on campus Watson notes there are 21 visually impaired students currently enrolled

Recovered property waiting for owners

Area residents who've had their homes broken into may find the stolen items sitting in the property room of the Oakland County Sheriff's Depart-ment

ment.
Oakland County Sheriff Johannes
Spreen Friday urged victims of breaking and enterings to examine property
confiscated by police during a unique
fencing operation begun on Jan 1 of
this year.

Twenty-one persons have already been arrested and the number could climb as high as 51 if more of the stolen merchandise is identified. Spreen

The fencing operation, believed to be the first of its kind in Michigan, was set up by undercover officers in a Waterford Township television repair

The purpose of the operation was to purchase stolen property from thieves and burglars while undercover officers posed as a "fence"— a person who buys and sells stolen merchandise

The project, undertaken by the sher-iff's department and federal Alcohol. Tobacco and Firearms agents, was named "Operation Chain Link,"

Thieves were photographed by spe-ial video equipment and in some cases officers were able to get the thieves to reveal where they had sto-len the property

DET. SGT. Gregory Putman of the sheriff's department, who was credit-ed with masterminding the operation, said efforts will be made to introduce

the video footage as evidence in court.

Thousands of dollars worth of the recovered stolen property has not bee
identified and will have to be autioned unless claimed by the owners.
Many of the stolen goods were putchased for about __actent of their
value, the sheriff said

The stolen goods include a Chevro-let van, several rifles and handguns, television sets, bicycles, sterce equip-ment, tools, tires, chain saws, CB radios and miscellaneous other items

Perhaps the most unusual item was a piece of radio eqipment stolen from a patrol boat belonging to the Grand Traverse County Sheriff's Dept

Spreen said the fencing operation was modeled after other similar operations in larger cities, including Washington D.C., but that it was done on a smaller scale

One alleged thief, while selling sto len merchandise to an undercover sheriff's deputy, said, "You know they did a deal like this in Washington where the police were fences."

About 10 undercover officers participated in the operation. Sgt. Putman said not one person came into the shop during the operation to have a television set repaired.

Spreen would not comment when asked if other undercover fencing operations are underway in Oakland County

He encouraged citizens to partici-pate in Operation Identification pro-grams so that owners of stolen mer-chandise can be located and thieves successfully prosecuted

at the U-M's Ann Arbor campus, 13 of them totally sightless. He says the maps will be loaned to these students for the duration of their college careers, to be returned for use by other blind students.

The maps are the work of Lloyd Tisi: an inmate of Jackson State Prison who has been working in the braille unit since 1968. He was assisted by another inmate. Anthony Elsworth.

This said it took about three and a half months to complete the maps, with the immates first using topographical maps to fashion a three-dimensional model of the entire campus out of illustration board. This and Elsworth then used this model as a mold for the final maps, which are made of a durable rubber-base synthetic material.

Tisi noted that, in addition to streets and buildings, the maps note such de-tails as curb cuts, ramps, steps and the presence of elevators in buildings
