Glick's work will be displayed throughout the area. and Glick's work will be packaged into a traveling show—something new for this year. Glick's work ranges from many one-of-a-kind forms, through a limited production series of utilitarian objects. Dinner ware, for example, can be had on a one-of-a-kind commission basis. But in spite of a heavy work schedule, the potter sets asside time for tours for children, teachers and craft groups; he leads workshops and travels as guest instructor or lecturer.

Recently, he was the recipient of a National Endowment for the Arts grant for support in writing a book on studio pottery.

His work can be found in a number of museum, university, art association and private collections.
