

# Javits lectures to overflow audience

It was standing room only at Congregation Shaarey Zedek last Tuesday evening when U.S. Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-New York) delivered the annual Adolph Richter Memorial Lecture.

"This is a lecture and not a speech," he began. "I'll not try to convince you but to enlighten you."

After thus setting the scene he began an hour-long presentation on U.S. foreign policy.

THE SENATOR listed a number of trouble spots in the world beginning with those on our immediate borders. "Looking to Canada, we face the threat of Canada facing the problems we encountered in the civil war, the threat of the Dominion of Quebec seceding," he said.

"With Mexico, the grave danger is over-population, with the population expected to double by the year 2000."

He noted the repressive policies within a number of South American countries which have induced President Carter to cut off aid to three countries on that continent.

Javits said the grave worry in Europe is about political stability, particularly in France and Italy.

"The danger there is from the far left," he said. "And the overhanging danger is that of another oil embargo which could ruin the European economy."

Javits said our overriding problem with the Soviet Union hinge on the Helsinki Agreement.

"We paid a big price," he pointed out. "We agreed not to disturb eastern European borders, to leave them as they have been since the Russians took over in that area after World War II. We paid our price, but they haven't paid theirs in terms of the human rights of citizens."

He called the China-USSR border situation "dangerous" and Africa a "seething cauldron" and a "powder keg that almost anything can set off."

But the hottest spot of all, in his estimation, is the Middle East.

"I BASE the case for Israel on the national interest of the United States," he said. "The U.S. is a nation whose self-interest dictates what it must do in terms of security and economy."

He said that aid to Israel in the coming year will amount to around \$2 billion.

"The Middle East is the source of the fuel which runs a great part of the civilized world," he said. "These resources are in peril, and the fact that Israel is there keeps them in less peril."

Javits recalled that the very U.S. first aid to the new nation of Israel was \$50 million in 1950.

"Israel's first expectations were rather tenuous," he said.

Regarding the new administration, Javits said:

"It is my deep belief that the president has set himself as his first objective, peace in the Middle East. He believes he can do it and he's gonna try. This will put great strain on Israel and on the American Jewish communities."

What worries me is that it will result in pressure on Israel and Israel is vulnerable."

Javits explained that Israel has "one of the most fantastic imbalances in foreign trade ever known."

"Yet," he said, "So courageous is the state of Israel that I believe it will stand up to the pressures."

JAVITS said the two factors which will save Israel are the "undefinable" Israelis and the understanding and

support of American Jewry."

"Over a period of time, a settlement is possible," he said. "What isn't possible is to wrap it all up in Geneva this fall."

The senator called 1977 a crucial year with the danger of an oil embargo as "a crushing burden which has brought England and Italy almost to bankruptcy."

He predicted that the new Israeli government will have to make "real" concessions.

"We must struggle for a true peace with open borders and the normal intercourse between nations," he said. "And that's the policy as announced by Jimmy Carter. As for time, I'm talking about a minimum of eight years and realistically, maybe 20."

Javits accused the president of going too far in suggesting a Palestinian homeland.

"The Palestinians are Arabs," he said. "They have lots of homelands. The best solution would be some sort of federal state between Jordan and the West Bank."

Javits is now in his fourth term and in his 28th year in the Congress. He was born in a tenement on the lower east side of Manhattan in 1901, the son of immigrant parents.
