It's light rail plan for Oakland

In one of the major compromises of Michigan politics, the board of the Southeastern Michigan Transportation authority Tuesday pointed the way for rapid transit for the next generation or more.

The way is light rail:

By a 94 vote, the SEMTA board indicated its "preference" so that General Manager Larry Salci and his staff can prepare a formal application to the federal government on a program that will ultimately cost 31.3 billion in current dollars.

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The SEMTA member referred to the fact that Young's heavy rail plan would have been built in Detroit only—to Eight Mile in the Woodward corridor and to Connor in the Gratiot

SIGNIFICANTLY, the four "no" votes were geographically scattered: Jolie Evans of Birmingham, Marilyn Orlayer of Ann Arbor, Tommy Tomlin-en of Macomb County and Dwight flavens of Grosse Pointe.

Mrs. Evans in recent weeks had sarply shifted her position in favor of the heavy rail option, arguing it was the only one which would have enough economic impact to rescue Detroit. In this regard, she wound up more strongly in favor of heavy rail than eve 1 Mayor Young.

Havens, a suburban Wayne County resident who heads the Greater Detroit Chamber of Commerce, didn't explain his vote.

ECONOMICS was the chief non-po-ECONOMICS was the chief non-po-litical reason the board picked the light rail alternative. The other three were: All-bus plus commuter ail in the Mirhigan corridor; heavy rail; and the "null" alternative, simply let-ting the present system expand nor-mally.



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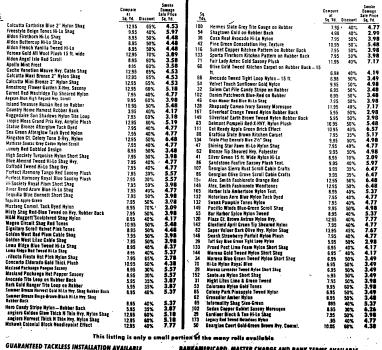
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
