PARKS COMMISSIONERS
Thursday night tabled the subject until a commutee looks into ramifications of the parks commissions using public money to finarce someone working for a private organization. "We have no financial report from board of directors," Commissioner Sandra Ducklow said. "We could be opening a Pandora's Box. I don't want to be the one to unlock it. There could be a million organizations wanting the same courtesies."

BETTY SUE DUPREE, who is considering the post of orchestra president for next year, later questioned the commissioners' reluctance to aid

e orchestra. "I'm surprised at their vision," she said. "There is a potential here."
She said Twp Atty, Paul Bibeau
had assured her. "Music is a function
of parks and rec."
She said all concert tickets might
be sold to patrons and sponsors, cutting down on promotional and sales
work. "I was hoping that Lorna (McE-

wen) could manage the publicity."
But Mrs. McEwen, who does public relations for the parks department, said. "I think they (the orchestra board) greatly underestimate the number of hours needed to do a good joblicity for the holiday concert that the parks commission undervrote. It was the orchestra's only sell-out.
"It would be a lot of pressure on a staff that likes to do a good job," she added.

SEVERAL WEEKS AGO, two orchestra board members met privately
with four parks commissioners at the
bome of Dick Richards, parks chairman. The gathering caused criticism
that an illegal, secret meeting had
been held.
