## Bridge

The difference between an aggressive defense and passive defense is frequently one trick. The defender's problem is that it is difficult to determine which defense produces the extra trick.

If declarer holds queen-jack in a suit, the defender gives up a trick by leading against a combination where the declarer can never win a trick if allowed to play the suit. The hand in the diagram is routine for declarer. The line of play is simple. Once the two top spades are yielded, the hearts are attacked. If something good happens, as it does here when declarer plays the ace and king, the fourth trick produces a discard for the losing diamond. South can now finesse against the club king and make an overtrick.

West led the queen of diamonds.

Even when the heart suit fails to produce a fourth trick, the club finesse is left to give declarer ten tricks.

The defenders can turn this around however. After the diamond lead, East can not reasonably sure that West does not have the ace, and no ruff is available. Should the diamond be returned, East still has a chance when the second high spade is won.

Lending a heart can do no harm. If partner holds two honors, declarer can win only three tricks at the most. If West has only one honor, the lead does no harm.

The club lead exerts the pressure. If declarer is forced to play clubs immediately, he can see that the club finesse is dangerous. If it loses West will win a high diamond to defeat the contract.
