

Hospital volunteers raise \$200,000

Two checks totaling \$200,000 were presented to Sinai Hospital by men and women of the Sinai Hospital Guild at the volunteers' annual luncheon meeting and fashion show in Southfield.

Mrs. Herbert Blumberg of Franklin, guild president, presented a check for \$150,000 and announced the gift as the beginning of an endowment fund to enrich charitable, scientific, medical and educational services at the hospital.

An additional check for \$50,000 was presented by gift shop manager, Mrs. Philip Krawitz of Southfield. All proceeds from the gift shop, which now total more than \$500,000 over its 24-year history are directly donated for research at the hospital.

Presented before more than 500 guild members and guests, the checks were accepted by Dr. Julien Priver, executive vice president of the hospital.

"We know that the Sinai Guild is tops among hospital volunteer organizations in the state and, as far as we know, in the nation," Dr. Priver said. "Your gifts of time and money are outstanding and certainly have enriched the quality of Sinai's contribution to the community."

Two landmarks were achieved by guild members this past year. First, total financial contributions to Sinai for research, building and equipment, enrichment of in-patient operation and

patient services surpassed the \$1 million mark and volunteer service hours went over the two million mark. In addition, the guild dropped "women's" from its name and accepted nearly 100 male members to the 4,500 member volunteer group.

Officers for 1977 were announced. Jane Blumberg of Franklin will continue as president. Serving with her will be: Mrs. Ray Shapiro of Northville, president-elect; Mrs. Abe Katzman of Oak Park, vice president for volunteer services; Mrs. Nathan Greenhouse of West Bloomfield, vice president for programming and membership; and Mrs. Max Langer of Oak Park, vice president for gift shop.

Others are: Sylvia Wiener of Southfield, treasurer; Mrs. Albert Burrows of West Bloomfield, assistant treasurer; Mrs. Milton Howard of Southfield, financial secretary; Mrs. Harry Aronow of Southfield, assistant financial secretary; Mrs. Avery Fried of Southfield, corresponding secretary and Mrs. Michael Weisenfeld of Farmington Hills, recording secretary.

Sunday is open house at Marian Oakland West

Marian Oakland West, the home for senior citizens located at 29250 Ten Mile, will be open for visitors from 1 to 4 p.m. May 22.

The archdiocesan home for seniors, located on the premises of St. Clare Church in Farmington Hills, was dedicated by Cardinal John Dearden last October. At present, it houses 53 seniors.

It is a housing facility for married or single persons who are ambulatory, able to care for themselves, and who enjoy the company of others their age. It is not a nursing home.

It was planned and is administered by a board of about 40 persons, most of whom reside within the Southfield-Farmington area.

The residence is available to per-

sons of all races, colors, creeds and religions, and rates are sufficiently reasonable to include those on social security incomes or old age assistance.

THE HOME is patterned after Kundig Center, located on Lawton and Ash avenues in Detroit.

Marian Oakland West is one of the first completed complexes which emulates Kundig's successful concept of private, one floor living quarters, with bath and shower, while meals are served in a common area. Spacious

central recreational and lounge facilities are reached by covered walkways in a campus-type setting. Residents receive weekly maid service, and personal laundry is done in a central area.

The home's overall objective is to encourage interaction on all fronts. Residents participate in all types of community activities.

A crew of volunteers furnishes transportation, and initiates a continuous calendar of activities.

Guests will be invited to tour, partake of refreshments, and meet staff and residents. nally ill, handicapped, emotionally ill, alcoholics or anyone who is sick and would like to experience the "blessing of the sick" is welcome along with their families. Refreshments will follow mass.

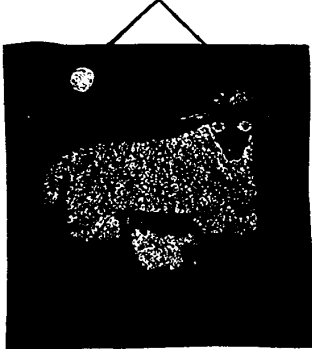

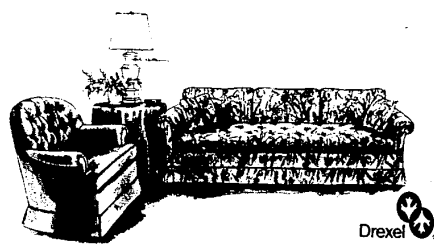

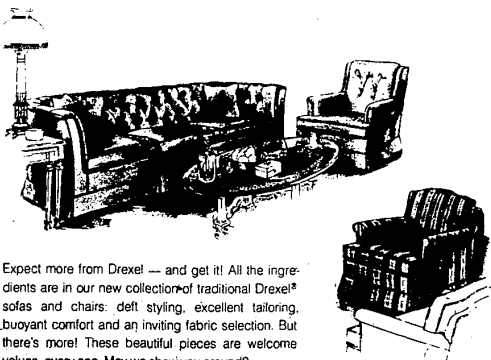
