Before leaving July 14 on the "7" marathon, the team will run a femiles on the track across from the Pontiac Ctty Hail. The first runner will then depart with the beton for an eight-mile log. This first leg of the relay is repeated by 10 runners. Eventually the race will cover nearly all of the Lower Peninsula from Gaylord to Traverse City through Cadillac and back to Pontiac.
