The Rag A Mullins experienced their first victory, beating the Angels 13-5. Laura Gable scored the Rag A Mullins' first home run of the season and Barbara Yount hit a bases-loaded triple.

Stacey Smith belted a three-run homer in the Goldiggers 11-4 victory over the Rag A Mullins.
