Trustees follows through on proposals
to write a land-use policy to protect remaining scenic lands on the collegefive gampuses.

The proposals made at a study session June 2 resulted from the efforts
of the Farmington Naturalists Club
and the OCC Campus Development
Committee to protect two parcels on
the colleges Orchard Ridge campus
in Farmington Hills from consideration as future building sites.
The controversy began when a strip

Bill McNaughton professor of biology at Orchard Ridge and a member of the Campus Development Committee and the Farmington Naturaliss Club, proposed that the board establish a policy which would probibly the arbitrary consideration of land for building on the Orchard Ridge campus. Later a general land use policy was suggested as a favorable alterative to a policy referring to any specific sites.

McNaughton and the naturalists originally proposed a policy which would have made the board take an active role in guiding any consideration of lands for construction sites. Also, the board would have to approve the selection of any specific site. McNaughton said. "We want to prevent architects, for future proiects from independently going off and considering these areas."

Trustee David C. Rogers, however, said McNaughton was asking the board to do the impossible "Please recognibe." Rogers said, "that you're asking us to say 'don't ever consistins' when, in reality, there will come a time when, at least, it must be considered."

The board left the door open for several actions. Under consideration is a resolution advising future boards to preserve Orchard Ridge lands. The board is also considering drafting a broad land-use policy as well as a resolution dealing specifically with the Orchard Ridge lands.

ACTION is expected to be taken at the next general meeting.

McNaughton justified his stand to protect the nature area along the campus' southern edge and a large swampy area forming the school's eastern boundary along Orchard Lake Road, saving, "I think of the woods as having tangible value. To me they have a priceless value.

"It won't be long and there won't be that much of this kind of land left in Oakland County.
"This will be an oasis for people to get away rom the Southfield and." The vonia type of mall," he predicted. "I feel very strongly that there should be a policy. If al sleep better at might it there were."

TRUSTEE David W. Hackett emerged as one of McNaughton's strongest supporters. "I would put 'hese lands off limits forever and ever and ever and tene even a little bit longer." Hackett said.

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
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
