

ADA delegate warns saccharin hoarders

Phyllaine Lahiff, a Farmington resident just returned from the national convention of the American Diabetes Association, said the saccharin ban fight has evolved into "a vicious circle."

The delegate from the Michigan affiliate of the association reported that among the biggest issues discussed was the hoarding of the sugar substitute by diabetics and an expected black market for saccharin users.

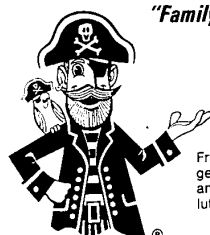
"We are afraid on both of these counts because of the expiration dates on the food products. We know those dates are there, but we don't know

how many people read them," she said. "We don't want one bad experience to turn into many, many more." The ADA has vocally opposed the upcoming ban on saccharin by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration. The ban was ordered two months ago after rats feed saccharin in a Canadian government test showed a higher than normal incidence of bladder cancer.

A long time volunteer worker for the state chapter of the national organization, Mrs. Lahiff is now secretary of the Michigan chapter and chairwoman of the South Oakland County unit of the organization.

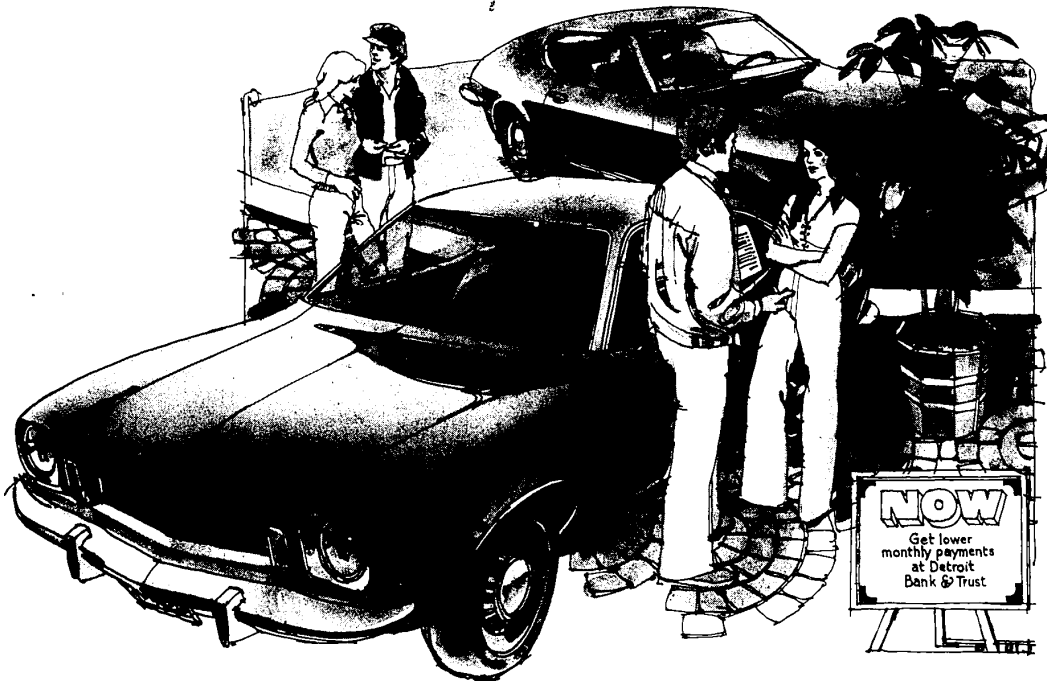
Henderson also was elected a Presidential Scholar. He is one of 121 seniors in the country who were given the honor, announced by the Commission of Presidential Scholars.
