High school student awaits June 24 trial

A Harrison High School student is awaiting a June 24 trial date in Oakland County Circuit Court in connection with a June 7 shooting incident at the school.

Kola Nikolas Camaj, 17, stood mute at his June 8 arraigment before 47th District Court Judge Margares Schaeffer. A plea of innocent was entered for him.

Bond was set at \$3,000 for each of the five counts against the youth. He is charged with two counts of felonious assault, carrying a concealed weapon and two charges of possessing a firearm while committing a felony. Board turns down state aid Schools reduce debt levy

The Farmington school board turned down \$30,000 in state aid for the debt levy but reduced the debt levy millage from 4.37 mills to 3.8 mills at last week's meeting.

The '2-mill reduction means a 50 cents drop in school taxes on every \$1,000 of assessed value for Farmington School District residents, despite the outcome of today's election.

To take advantage of the \$30,000 from the state, the board was required to reduce the debt levy by one
